Very simple tailored suits or dresses prevail, absolutely without exaggeration of shape.

Half the world is in high, front-laced boots, black or tan, minus all friskiness. The other half is wear-low-cut shoes. Stockings match either the shoes or the dress. All smart shoes and boots here have very short vamps and round toes. The long American vamp is not liked at all. Therefore, the many American shoes sold here are made in different lasts from those liked in the United States.

New hats have crowns of felt and brims of straw. Blue and gray is a favorite combination.

Two weeks of ocean travel—my tenth crossing the Atlantic since war began—makes me hungry for dry-land amusement, and in the ten days since I arrived I have listened to operas, all the way from Samson and Delilah to Thais, laughed at "Potash and Perlmutter" in French, and marvelled over Julius Caesar in the movies.

Among the prettiest decollette frocks is one of pale blue taffeta embroidered in silver flowers, combined with wide silver lace, the lace forming the draped train.

Charming gowns with black Chantilly, the lace forming the short sleeves, and the back of the bodice, while the draped front of the corsage is of the cloth of gold.

Ruchings and taffeta with frayed edges trim a chic day gown of satin—all in a taupe-tinted brown—save for the pale blue ribbon used for neck and sleeve facings.

The new models follow the outline of the figure rather closely to the waist, and thence the natural form divine is clouded (but not altogether disguised by metres of supply stuffs that sway and float with every movement.

The fashionably dressed woman is really a charming picture. From lingerie to veil there is nothing ultra except ultra chic. Lingerie is fine and soft as the silk worm can spin, or else is made of muslin delicate enough for a christening robe.

Corsets have lines that would make Venus herself sorry she lived in Milo so long ago. Really, as you may prove to yourself by trying on the new Redfern corsets which, on sale in your own town, carry the inspiration of Parisian smartness, the new shapes are comfortable as gloves, yet are so designed as to control and mould the figure.

Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12th, 1916 for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the lamp hole at the Eastern end of the lateral sewer now in place in the Santiam Road and extending in a southeasterly direction along said Santiam Road a distance of 320 feet, in Hackleman's Heir's 1st Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the character and ordinances of said City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder of said city, where the plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12, 1916.
No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$100.00 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of November, 1916, under a liquidated penalty of \$250 per day for each day of delay beyond that period.
