SOCIALISTS PASS SOME STRONG RESOLUTIONS

Declare That Our Boasted Civilization Has Become Slaughter House.

Following is the platform adopted by the Socialists at their convention Saturday afternoon:

Platform adopted by the Socialist party in Linn county:

The Socialists of Linn county in convention assembled, reaffirm our belief in the principles of international socialism as the only means through which economic justice can be obtained, and peace on earth, good will toward men be made possible.

Therefore, we re-assert our support of the national and state platforms and to the very favorable consideration of our candidates, Allen L. Benson for president, and George R. Kirkpatrick for vice-president of the United States.

The competitive system and its accompaniment—grab or be grabbed—has proven a failure, and our much-boasted civilization has degenerated into an efficient slaughter of human beings. And for what? Profits! Individual profit and national profit.

However, no calamity can be so depraving that some good lesson may not be drawn from it. Such a lesson has been shown in the action of the Australian government in taking over the whole commerce in wheat through which the price paid the farmer has been materially increased and that to the consumer reduced, consults in foreign countries acting as sales agents.

This step toward socialism has proven of such value to the producer in securing for him the full value of his product, that we pledge our nominees if elected to use every effort in their power to secure such a system in the United States.

NEWSPAPER PEOPLE SUED.

Oregon City Editor and Wife Sued for \$20,000 for Libeling Superintendent of Schools.

Oregon City, June 22.—City School Superintendent Toose today filed a libel suit for \$20,000 against H. B. Cartledge, foreman of the Oregon City Enterprise, and Mrs. P. Gregory Cartledge, his wife, who was head of the English department of the school. Mr. and Mrs. Cartledge were the authors of Bulletin No. 1, in which a demand was made for a public investigation of the friction in school affairs.

The suit is the second action for libel filed by the city superintendent of schools. Mr. Toose instituted an action against Claude G. Miner, principal of the high school, for \$20,000, for writing a letter to J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction, in which Mr. Toose was charged with writing anonymous letters and immorality.

Another suit against Mrs. Cartledge alone, based on the letter of resignation sent to the school board, is pending. It is known that the papers in the case have been prepared.
