OBITUARY.

Isaac Newton Warmouth died in Halsey, Oregon, Monday, June 19, 1916, of heart failure. He was born in Trenton, Mo., September 19, 1839, and was one of a family of eleven children, all of whom have passed beyond with the exception of one brother, B. R. Warmouth, of Bellingham, Washington, who attended the funeral in Halsey, Wednesday, June 21, 1916.

With his parents he crossed the plains to California in 1864. In the fall of 1865 he came to Oregon where he resided in and near Brownsville and Halsey. He was married to Irene Keeney, October 22, 1873, his first wife died August 4, 1879, and on October 17, 1887, he married Mary Jane Bassett, to this union one child was born, Edward Newton, of Halsey, who remains to mourn his demise, his wife having died February 24, 1904.

Mr. Warmouth was a member of the A. O. U. W. and Odd Fellows lodge of Halsey and a member an trustee of the Baptist church of Brownsville.

EASTERN K. P. PAPER GIVES ALBANY FINE NOTICE

Fred Wheaton Writes About His Albany Visit in a Very Interesting Manner.

Local members of the Knight of Pythias have received copies of the Pythian Advocate, a publication of nationwide circulation, in which Fred E. Wheaton, of Minneapolis, supreme keeper of records and seal of the Knights of Pythias, has written an account of the Rathbone Bible classes held in Oregon in April. The class initiated at this city receives especial mention and as a result of that meeting Albany is receiving considerable publicity in various Pythian publications. "It was appropriately fitting that Albany, the home city of Grand Chancellor Marks, should qualify the largest class of the series. The members of Laurel Lodge No. 7—leading fraternal institution in that delightful city—took hold of this movement with a determination not only to do honor to themselves, but also to honor their great leader. Albany has another princely Pythian in the person of Laflin M. Curl, past supreme representative, and the present mayor of the city. From the standpoint of individual esteem, Brother Curl is the recognized leader and 'daddy' of local Pythian enterprise, to whom is credited the enviable distinction of providing Laurel lodge with its magnificent Pythian building, which occupies a half-block in the very heart of the city.

"Local papers stated that 'over sixty candidates' would be present for this class initiation—the fact is that there were 75 candidates marshalled in this eventful demonstration. Sister lodges located in Salem, Eugene, Corvallis, Independence, Silverton, Lebanon, Brownsville and Scio, were well represented by delegations of members, some bringing numerous candidates. This was one of the largest classes ever initiated by the Pythian order in Oregon. Fully 300 knights assembled for the occasion, taxing the capacity of the commodious, and well-appointed castle hall. As at The Dalles, so in Albany, also in Astoria and Baker City, the candidates were selected from the finest walks in life, leading business and professional men. An unique feature at Albany was the fact that a father and two sons were members of the class.

"Upon arrival of the visiting officials at the Oregon Electric depot, they were met by the local lodge, visiting lodges, and the Albany band, where an automobile parade was started, extending for several blocks, terminating at the lodge hall. This demonstration aroused great public interest, and the city as a whole gave cordial welcome to the occasion which made the Knights of Pythias Rathbone Bible class one of the leading events in the history of Albany. That decidedly popular Pythian, Frank S. Grant, past grand chancellor, occupied the station of chancellor. Many of the most prominent knights in Oregon were present, including H. G. Wortman, of Medford, grand vice-chancellor Jesse Spencer, of Corvallis, grand master-at-arms; Laflin M. Curl, John L. Hill and D. E. Yorlan, past grand chancellors; W. J. H. Clark, of Portland, general secretary of the Supreme Lodge convention committee; James B. E. Bourne, of Rainier, editor and publisher of The Senator.

"Preceding the initiatory work, honors were accorded the visitors in connection with which brief remarks were made, mainly expressions of congratulation. From the fact that a large delegation was present from Central Lodge No. 18, Salem, the lodge of which the late and beloved 'Lew' Stinson was a member, a special word of tribute and grateful remembrance was spoken in his honor. In the ritualistic ceremonies, the utmost impressiveness was maintained, and the lesson of the rank of page was imparted to a decidedly attentive class. Throughout the evening, all present caught the earnestness and spirit of the occasion, making of it a season of decided fellowship and distinct Pythian importance. Following the work, refreshments were served in the banquet hall.

"Laurel lodge is especially to be congratulated upon its possession of a splendid property, the Pythian building, a 'home' ideal in every particular. Not only is the lodge well accommodated, but the order in that city and domain is thus given a standing of exceptional prominence."
