

ON THE WAY TO FIGHT MEXICO

**Soldiers Pass Through From
Clackamas to San Diego For
Preparatory Encampment.**

**FIVE THOUSAND PEOPLE
GREET THEM AT THE TRAIN**

**Corvallis People Come Over
By Hundreds to See Their
Boys Go Thru.**

There have been few more striking depot scenes here or anywhere than that of last night, when at least five thousand people were at the Southern Pacific depot to see the companies of infantry from Salem, Corvallis, Woodburn and Dallas pass through on their way to San Diego, where they will go into camp preparatory to service in Mexico when needed. There were three hundred and seventy-four on board, in a long train of fifteen cars, consisting of passenger, baggage and freight cars.

On account of the uncertainty of the time of leaving Clackamas and the making of the trip it had to be uncertain when they would arrive. Many waited for over three hours around the depot. The train arrived at 9:10.

Coming over from Corvallis were about a hundred auto loads of prominent people, many of them having members of their families in the Corvallis company. Lawyer C. H. Glos had a nineteen-year-old son on board, Mrs. W. S. McFadden a son, Prof. Skelton, of the O. A. C. a young son, and many others. The boys jumped out to see their folks and sweethearts, and there was very properly the freedom of hugging and kissing seen in the home.

While there is a feeling that the danger in this war is not great it will be founded he'll just the same, if it transpires, if not with bullets, with disease.

Among the Corvallis boys was Horace Ritchie, formerly of this city, only about eighteen. Franklin Miller, formerly of Albany, was with the Salem boys.

Patriotic music was furnished by the Albany and Corvallis bands, and the Corvallis band of five or six with the flag floating furnished martial music in front of the depot.

Corvallis people showed their appreciation of their boys by presenting them with boxes of all manner of things, including a complete baseball outfit. Also \$200 in cash for extra things they will need.

Altogether it was a scene to stir the hearts of all present, and, although there was a spirit of good humor beneath it all was a feeling of sorrow that such a thing is necessary.

Camp Withycombe, Clackamas, Or., June 28.—Battery A, Oregon field artillery, entrained at 9 o'clock this morning for Calexico, Cal., in response to a hurry-up order received late yesterday. There were 170 men in the battery—eight more than the law allows a war-strength artillery unit.

The Second battalion, which will leave today, carries 344 men. Thursday's troop movements call for the departure of the First battalion, regimental headquarters, and supply and machine gun companies—a total of 448 men. Troop A, cavalry, with 116 men and with Adjutant-General White acting as captain, will entrain Friday. The captaincy of the troop was formally offered to General White today.

A total of 1416 men will be sent from Camp Withycombe to the Mexican border. They comprise the following organizations:

Third Regiment, First battalion, Companies A, McMinnville; B, C, D, Portland; Second battalion, Companies E, F, H, Portland, and Company G, Oregon City; Third battalion, Companies I, Woodburn, K, Corvallis, L, Dallas, and M, Salem.

Battery A, Field artillery.

Troop A, Cavalry.

Attached to the Third regiment are also the supply and machine gun companies, the hospital corps and sanitary corps.

The train passed through Albany at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

TWO BOYS START OUT FOR NEWPORT OUTING

**With a Complete Outfit Get As
Far As Albany When Stopped
By the Police.**

Starting out for an outing at Newport, without the knowledge of their parents, Ivan Jones, aged 12, and Lyle Jones, aged 6, sons of Joseph M. Jones residing two miles this side of Chemawa, got no further than Albany, a difficult place to pass.

Upon their disappearance yesterday Mr. Jones notified the Albany police and this morning Night Policeman S. C. Worrell found the boys just preparing to board the Yaquina train, with a half-fare round-trip ticket from Salem, for the older boy. They arrived last night about 8 o'clock, on the delayed Brownsville train, and put up at a rooming house on Lyon street.

When taken charge of by Policeman Worrell the boys had the following brand new articles: Two bowie knives, two hunting axes, two fish poles and reels, two flash lights, four boxes of .22-calibre shells, a pocket-book, and an old suit case and .22-calibre gun. The new things they said they bought at Hauser Bros., Salem. They had \$2.10 in cash.

According to the older boy, the way they got their money for their trip was by taking a \$20 gold-piece from their father's pocket.

The boys didn't seem to appreciate the fact that they had done anything out of the ordinary. They are nice-looking fellows, well-dressed, and had evidently been poisoned by the reading of the older boy.

Mr. Jones came up this noon and took the boys home.

ROUMANIA MAY JOIN THE ALLIES

Bulgaria Has Troops Concentrating Along Roumanian Frontier.

**GREECE MAY ALSO BE
BROUGHT INTO ACTION**

Austria Wants Verdun Abandoned and German Soldiers Hurried to Her Aid.

London, June 28.—Reports have been revived that Roumania is preparing to join the allies. A heavily censored Bucharest dispatch via Athens reported that Bulgaria is closed to the Roumanian frontier. Bulgarian troops are reported concentrating along the frontier. Another Bucharest message declared that the Roumanian cabinet in a special session took steps as a result of Bulgaria's movements. Vienna reported the Bulgars uneasy because Greece yielded to the demands of the allies for fear that Venizelos' return to power is swinging Greece on the allies' side. The Roumanians and Greeks may invade Bulgaria from opposite sides. Berlin dispatches are silent about Balkan developments and emphasized the heavy British bombardment. It is believed continued cannonading and systematic attack will wreck the German works in preparation for an infantry onslaught. Switzerland correspondents reported the success of the Russian and Italian offensives is causing direct consternation in Vienna and Austrians demand the abandonment of the Verdun offensive, sending more troops to the Austrian front.

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STELLMACHER TO CAPTAIN COMPANY

**Albany Allotted Company in
New Regiment Proposed to
Be Formed in Oregon.**

**COL. C. U. GANTENBEIN GET-
TING READY FOR CALL**

**Volunteers All Over State Are
Pouring Names to the Re-
cruiting Officers.**

While not officially authorized to do so, Colonel C. U. Gantenbein, of Portland, has issued a call to organize a full regiment of volunteer soldiers in Oregon.

It will be commanded and officered almost entirely by veterans of the Spanish-American war, and a large proportion of the men enlisting will have seen active service. Already a large number of applications have been received by Colonel Gantenbein.

There are 12 companies in a regiment and it is planned to organize six of these in Portland and six from throughout the state, probably as follows: Albany, Roseburg, Prineville, Oregon City and two other cities yet to be named.

Captain Frank C. Stellmacher, Spanish War veteran and past commander of the U. S. W. V., will be recommended for captaincy of the Albany company. A letter received by Captain Stellmacher from Colonel Gantenbein asks that he secure the names of those who will enlist, together with their addresses, occupations, age, married or single, and previous military experience, if any. These will be forwarded to Portland as received.

No new company will move from Albany until the Coast Artillery corps has left. About 20 men are still needed in that organization to bring it up to full strength, and Captain Knox is anxious to fill out to full requirement as soon as possible. The call for the local company, which will probably go to the border as infantry, is expected the last of this week or early next week.

The new regiment will be completely organized for service. It will have a full set of officers, an ambulance corps, machine gun company, engineers, supply company, etc. The officers of the new regiment to date follows: Colonel, C. U. Gantenbein, former major Second Oregon Volunteers in Spanish-American war; Lieutenant-Colonel W. E. Finzer, Spanish war veteran; Major First battalion, C. E. McDonnell, captain Company H in the Philippines; Captains, F. C. Stellmacher, Albany; Dr. J. F. Drake, A. W. Orton, Richard Deich, Portland; Jap H. Upton, Prineville; G. W. Martin, Oregon City; F. W. Haynes, Roseburg, and others not yet named. Each captain will be allowed to recommend his own lieutenants. Applications are coming in from all over the state from men who are volunteering their services and applying for commissions. Married men are discouraged from enlisting.

This morning Captain Stellmacher, in a long-distance telephone call from Portland, was told that 20 men there with whom he attended school would join his company in case one was organized. All were husky athletes and will make a fine nucleus.

BAPTISTS TO ORDAIN NEW MINISTER AT BROWNSVILLE

Rev. M. O. Pierce to Be Officially Ordained By Church and College Thursday.

Brownsville Baptist church is making great preparations for the ordination services for Rev. M. O. Pierce, who will be officially ordained as a Baptist minister at that place Thursday. A large number of the members from the Albany church will go over, headed by Dr. G. H. Young, who is especially interested in Rev. Pierce. Rev. Pierce was a student in Da. Young's classes when he taught at Colgate University, New York.

Rev. Pierce will be examined by a council composed of delegates of the churches in the Central association and also by the state officers of the church. A number of outside friends have been invited. Among the prominent men from out of the city will be Dr. Champion, of McMinnville; Dr. Woodley, of Portland, and Dr. Petty, of Portland, who will conduct the examination on the Christian Faith, and officers from McMinnville will conduct the examination on the knowledge of the Bible and modern religious thought.

The program will consist of a doctrinal sermon, by Dr. Alonzo Petty; a charge to the candidate by Dr. G. H. Young, a charge to the church (speaker unassigned) and ordination prayer, by W. P. Elmore.

Rev. Pierce graduated from Leland Stanford, Jr. University last month with high honors and is highly regarded. A very successful career is predicted for him. He has been offered an assistantship in the department of history at Stanford.

PRISONERS MUST BE RELEASED

**If Not By Midnight Tonight
American Soldiers Will
Go After Them.**

**MEXICANS HAVE 55,000
SOLDIERS READY**

**Threat That All the Prisoners
Will Be Executed If U. S.
Interferes.**

Washington June 28.—Carranza must release the American prisoners at Chihuahua by midnight or President Wilson will go after them. Those near the president today declared there will be no delay because of Carranza demands to release Mexican prisoners in this country. This goes with the food embargo and other questions, declare the officials. The president is solely interested in getting the American soldiers from Chihuahua penitentiary. Congress is quietly awaiting Carranza's reply, which is expected early this afternoon. There is persistent feeling that Carranza will yield. It is known positively that he first intended to release the prisoners. Danger lies in the possibility of Carranza for exchange of prisoners. If he took this position in the otherwise delayed freedom of the Americans, the president would follow the course already determined and would not include a declaration of war to mean the rescue of the Americans by force. However long and arduous the effort, the president would outline the intended course and ask congress for support of the program.

El Paso, June 28.—Hope of looting has buoyed up the half-starved, poorly clothed peons of Carranza's northern army. The interior of Mexico reports that they would have plenty of food when they reached El Paso. Refugees reported ten thousand soldiers en route to Chihuahua from the south, bringing the total forces of that state up to fifty-five thousand men. The Americans here plan to spoil the alleged lootin party.

Guns overlooking Juarez could ruin it within half an hour. Arrivals quoted the Carranzista commander as saying: "Mexico is prepared for war. If the Americans move towards Chihuahua in an attempt to rescue the twenty-five negro cavalrymen held as prisoners, they will be lined up before the walls of the penitentiary and executed. If Americans attempt any attacks on Carranzistas, they will receive a rain of shot and shell from fifty thousand Mexican troops."

Congressman Smith, of El Paso, arrived here today and says he believes congress will pass a declaration of war this week.

Probably a Canard.

Laredo, June 28.—Refugees from Monterey brought a rumor of Japanese officers heading the Mexican troops en route to Chihuahua. It is not confirmed. The rumor also said that Japanese are directing the manufacture of munitions at the Monterey arsenal.

Columbus, N. M., June 28.—

Six Mexicans, believed to be the band who murdered William Parker and wife, are reported wiped out in a fight south of Nachite last night. A message said a civilian posse encountered the bandits.

Columbus, N. M., June 28.—

Twenty Mexican bandits have been captured near El Valle and are being brought north under guard in a motor truck train.

Steamers Sunk.
