THE members of Kekuku's Hawaiian Quintet, coming to Chautauqua, are principally drawn from the Allisy and Toots Puka Troupes, who roused such a wild fever of enthusiasm throughout the United States several years ago. Kekuku was the instrumentalist featured in both companies. He, together with his players, toured with the "Bird of Paradise" Company. Joseph Kekuku is the originator of the steel pick, adding a two hand fingering method of the guitar that has made Hawaiian music famous the world over. To this artist belongs that half ready, dreamlike, whispering hum of the guitar and inopatch, that plaintive, witching charm, which in its lulling sweetness even rivals the possibilities of the human voice.
