

CARRANZA WILL NOT BE DEFIANT

Will Simply Insist That Soldiers Are Infringement on Sovereignty of Mexico.

A WITHDRAWAL OF EXPEDITION NOT DEMANDED

Efforts of Pan-American States Have Had Good Effect on Carranza.

(By United Press)

Washington, July 1.—Advices today indicated that Carranza will not adopt a defiant tone in answering President Wilson's demand. Instead he will send a firm note emphasizing the fact that he considers the presence of the American troops in Mexico an infringement upon the sovereignty of the nation.

The United Press informant, whose information heretofore has proven correct, indicates that Carranza's answer will not bring a breach between the nations. General Aguilar's statement published yesterday, is interpreted as intended for home consumption. Despite the language of the statement, the state department officials said the Mexican reply is manifestly milder than Carranza's first note. It doesn't demand the withdrawal of the American expedition, though it suggests it hasn't the right to stay. The note has not reached the state department at noon. Officials thought the effort of South American and European American diplomats to swing Carranza into line might result fruitfully.

TILLAMOOK LIKES THE ALBANY CITY BAND

Twelve Local Players Will Help Coast Band at July 4th Celebration.

That the Albany City band is appreciated in other places than in this city is shown by the fact that yesterday Manager Edwin Fortmiller received a telegram from the Tillamook Fourth of July committee asking him to send twelve good players to augment the band at that place. The request also is accompanied by a very fine financial inducement, and was accepted at once. The boys will receive, besides their expenses, more money for the one day's work than they are receiving individually from the city for the entire season.

The home boys have developed an organization that the entire city should feel a keen pride in. They have stuck together through all kinds of discouragement and rebuffs and have loyally stayed in training to make a creditable representation for the city. With very few exceptions they have paid their expenses from their own funds and have hardly had what could be called support from the people in the past. The city has just begun to recognize that they have a band second to none in the state outside of Portland and the weekly concerts have come to be anticipated and are well attended. Salem pays \$2000 to her band for the summer concerts, Eugene pays \$1500, and the concerts form a pleasant part of the summer life of both communities. The boys are in hopes of proper support next year when a full band can be furnished and concerts given perhaps twice a week.

BIG REGISTRATION.

Three Hundred Attending the Summer School at O. A. C.—Eight From Linn County.

Corvallis, July 1.—Twenty-three of Oregon's thirty-four counties are represented in the registration of the 300 teachers attending the summer session of the Oregon Agricultural College.

Benton county, the county home of the college, has 60 of these; Multnomah is second with 62; other counties with their registrations follow: Marion, 19; Lane, 12; Washington, 12; Umatilla, 10; Linn, 8; Yamhill, 10; Jackson, 9; Tillamook, Clackamas, Josephine, 2 each; Douglas, Wasco, 4 each; Coos, Moro and Sherman, 2 each; Clatsop, Baker, Lincoln, Klamath, Polk and Wallowa, 1 each. At the end of the second week there were 111 men and 189 women in attendance. Ten states and three foreign countries outside of Oregon are represented. Of these Washington leads with 20 and California is second with 14. Minnesota is represented by one student that came west to take manual training work with his former teacher, Professor F. H. Shepherd.

The greatest number of students are registered in industrial arts, 195 taking this subject. Registration is also very large in home economics and in commerce. Fifty-three are taking the work of physical education for women.

RETAIL JEWELERS MEET IN ALBANY

Will Convene Here July 24 and 25 With Fine Program of Events.

First Time the State Association Has Ever Met Outside of Portland.

ALL BUT FOUR MEN TAKE FEDERAL OATH

One Member Leaves Good Position and Comes From Tillamook to Be on Hand.

When called upon last night to take the federal oath all members of the Fifth Company, Coast Artillery Corps, signed their names to the roll except Corporal Percy Philpot, privates Elgin Newton, Wm. J. Keith and Otto Horton. Corporal Philpot was stripped of his stripes by Lieutenant Collins and reduced to the rank of private. This action was unofficial and without the sanction of Captain R. R. Knox, but it is said that this action will be officially taken later. Captain Knox was unable to say last night just what would be done. In the East and South similar cases have arisen and the members of the militia refusing were court-martialed and compelled to take the federal oath.

Following the refusal of the four men to take the oath they were made the targets of jeers and shouts of their comrades. Sergeant Miles McKee was put in charge and drilled them for more than an hour after the dismissal of the other members of the company. Loud-sounding torpedoes were slammed on the floor and walls with resounding effect. At the close of the drill Sgt. McKee presented the men with tin medals on which yellow bulls' eyes were painted.

Sixty men took the oath last night. About 25 more were out of the city. Twelve are working in the lumber camp at Mill City, two are in California and others are scattered in various places. All, however, are in communication with Captain Knox, who says that all will sign the oath and are ready to go to the front if they are called.

The oath was given last night to comply with the new act of congress making the militia a part of the federal army. The men will begin drawing a small pay today. In order to take advantage of the appropriation the company had to be sworn in before July 1.

Dorsey B. Rutherford, a bridge construction foreman on the S. P. quit a \$175 a month job and hastened to Albany yesterday from near Tillamook. Rutherford enlisted two years ago when trouble with Mexico was threatened and was so afraid that his company would be called and leave him that he left his work and hurried out where he could be in reach.

CHAUTAUQUA TO HAVE PAGEANT

Will Open With One By All the Sunday Schools of the City.

PARADE TO BE FROM THE CITY PARK

Prizes to Be Given Best Showing in Parade and Treatment of Subject.

The first day of Chautauqua is to be characterized by a big pageant, in which all the schools of the city will participate according to the following program:

Each school is to congregate at their own church at 1 o'clock, sharp; then to arrange in division to march three deep, as near as possible in the following order. Each school is to be led by a lad bearing aloft a gilded cross, followed by the pastor and superintendent. Then automobiles carrying the beginners and primary departments; then the Juniors, intermediate and adult departments will follow three deep, and automobiles bearing old folks will bring up the rear. Officers and teachers to walk at each side of the lines.

The schools will then march to the old Central school grounds, and from there will walk in a union parade through the city and thence on to the Chautauqua auditorium, and will march in the following alphabetical order, with the schools, subject and color:

Baptist—"Light," Yellow.

Christian—"Wisdom," Blue and Gold.

Evangelical—"Joy," White and Red.

Methodist—"Love," Red.

First Presbyterian—"Freedom," Sky Blue.

Grace Presbyterian—"Hope," White and Blue.

United Presbyterian—"Missions," White and Yellow.

A section in the auditorium will be reserved for each school, and a program in which every school will participate, using five minutes to represent their word. A banner bearing these words "Grand Prize, Sunday School Pageant, Albany Chautauqua, 1916," will be awarded on the following points:

First—The interpretation of subject.

Second—Decorative scheme.

Third—Department in line, and percentage of enrollment represented in parade.

Special prizes will be awarded as follows:

1. School with largest percentage of enrollment, first prize, picture.

2. School with most unique features, second prize, picture.

3. School with best display of banners, third prize, picture.

Following the program in the auditorium there will be games and sports as follows:

1. Boys under 15, 75-yard dash; pair of shoes.

2. Boys, 15 to 20, 100-yard dash; necktie.

3. Men, 10-yard dash; Linnore ham.

4. Sack race; pair of cuff buttons.

5. Potato race; stick pin.

6. Tug of war, each minister to furnish four men; winning side, large watermelon.

7. Girls under 15, 50-yard dash; tennis shoes.

8. Girls, 15 to 20, 50-yard dash; pr. Phoenix silk hose.

9. Women, 50-yard dash; piano scarf.

10. Egg race; box of stationery.

11. Ball game between champion players; ball and bat.

The climax of the afternoon will be a large, old-fashioned basket picnic, tables will be spread under the trees. President Lee of the college presiding. Each school will supply six large pitchers for pouring coffee, cups, paper plates and spoons enough for their respective schools, and every one to bring their supper and leave it at their church, before the parade commences.

OVER 300 GALLONS LOGANBERRY JUICE MADE

First Day's Run Proves Satisfactory and Berries Are Said to Be the Best.

The first day's run of the Albany Fruit Juice company's plant netted 300 gallons of beautiful clear, red loganberry nectar, and the managers are more than pleased with the start. Small lots of berries came in all day and a press was made before 6 o'clock. But at 8:30 B. E. Walgamot, of Brownsville, arrived with 2700 pounds of fruit, the whistle was blown and the men got back on the job. The entire lot was run through in one hour and ten minutes. Walgamot had a breakdown between Lebanon and this city and was considerably delayed. George G. Brown states that the quality of the juice made here is superior to anything he has yet seen. The berries yield a clearer, purer juice than any he has ever handled before. He is more than pleased with the prospect. The growers are now wishing for a few days of sunshine to ripen the berries at a more rapid rate.

MORO CLOUDBURST HAD FOUR VICTIMS DROWNED

Two Were in House, Others on the Hillside; Bodies All Recovered.

Moro, Or., July 1.—The bodies of four victims of the cloudburst in Hay Canyon were recovered today. A wall of water twenty feet high swept down the canyon at 6 o'clock last night. Mrs. Fortune and daughter, Mrs. Lawrence, were occupying a ranch house near Monkland, and were inside the house when the flood struck. The house was carried off and demolished. Two miles below. The body of Mrs. Lawrence was found four miles down stream, and Mrs. Fortune nine miles down the valley this morning. Three men camped in a tent under a hillside were repairing the road, and fled to a nearby knoll when the water swept their tent away. Seeing the higher water coming, the two crossed the ravine and attempted to reach higher ground. One was entangled in brush and drowned, and the other pulled himself safely away. The third remaining on the knoll was swept away and killed. The men's bodies were found three miles down stream.

Official statements are fragmentary. The drive began a few hours after the Germans launched the most powerful onslaughts at Verdun for many weeks. Paris announced the Germans were repulsed sanguinarily everywhere, except where they recaptured Thiaumont.

The British captured Serre Montauban, it is semi-officially announced. The French captured Carlu, in Savoir Wood, advancing two kilometers. The further statement was announced of the capture of Laboiselle, and it is declared the English hold the ground north of Fricourt, attacking Beaumont Hamel. London newspapers, in the largest, blackest type, announced the great allied offensive begun. The French hold the east part of Contalmaison, four miles northeast of Albert and are fighting around Mametz six miles east of Albert.

Paris, July 1.—The Germans resumed the drive at Verdun in most powerful attacks on both banks of the Meuse. The most violent fighting in weeks developed northwest of the fortress. In a series of attacks west of the Meuse, the Germans captured the fortified works and elements connecting the trenches east of Hill 304. The French counter-attacks ousted them. East of the Meuse they penetrated Thiaumont again. The redoubt itself was entirely smashed by terrific artillery fire.

Berlin, July 1.—Repeated British and French attacks at many points along the German front were "everywhere repulsed," said the official statement this afternoon. French attempts to recapture Froideville and Thiaumont, near Verdun, were repulsed with severe losses. "It is not clear whether the statement includes the operations of the British front today."

For Dependent Families.

Washington, July 1.—The house passed the Hay resolution appropriating two million dollars to relieve dependent families of married militiamen. There were only two dissenting votes. It authorizes the secretary of war to pay the family without income fifty dollars monthly. Representatives James of Michigan and Small of North Carolina, voted against it.

June Rainfall.—

The total rainfall for the month of June as given out at the office of F. M. French, was 1.02 inches. A period of 16 days from June 2 to 17 was without rain. This does not include yesterday after 8 a. m. Yesterday's rainfall was .82 inch, almost as much as fell during the entire month.

Small Auto Accident.—

Learning to run an auto always has its ups and downs, and often its accidents. Yesterday evening the new Ford auto of Mrs. Gilmour was being driven along Second street, when the machine on account of the slippery pavement took a notion to sidestep, and barely missed a telephone pole near the shop of Clyde Dannels, banged into the house next door east, making a small hole in the building and knocking the lights out of the machine.
