Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12th, 1916 for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the lamp hole at the Eastern end of the lateral sewer now in place in the Santiam Road and extending in a south-easterly direction along said Santiam Road a distance of 320 feet, in Hackleman's Her's 1st Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the character and ordinances of said City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder of said city, where the plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12, 1916.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$100.00 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of November, 1916, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 per day for each day of delay beyond that period.
