Transferred to Springfield—

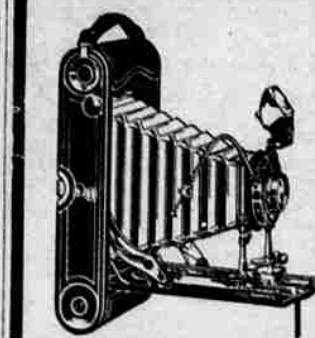

ALBANY MAN GETS LETTER FROM MRS. CAPTAIN BOYD

Served With Capt. Boyd, Carri-zal Victim, During Philippine Campaign.

Robert F. Greene, valley representative of Blake, McFall & Co., has just received a letter from Mrs. Captain Boyd, whose husband was killed in the Carri-zal raid. Mr. Greene was with Captain Boyd for a year and a half during the Philippine campaign, and they were intimate friends. Upon hearing of the news of the death of Captain Boyd, he wrote a letter of condolence to Mrs. Boyd, receiving her reply. He speaks very highly of Captain Boyd, a man of intrepid bravery, as well as a splendid fellow personally. Mr. Greene is a member of the Spanish War Veterans of this city, and also of the Sons of the American Revolution, being a descendant of General Greene of revolutionary fame.

FEES FOR COUNTRY ROADS.

Nearly Two Million and a Half Vehicles, or More Than One for Every Mile Registered.

Washington, July 5.—Ninety per cent of the registration and license fees paid in 1915 by automobilists to the states, or \$16,213,387, was spent for the building and maintenance of county and state roads, according to a compilation just published by the Office of Public Roads, U. S. department of agriculture. In all, 2,445,664 motor vehicles were registered in that year and their owners paid a total of \$18,245,713 for registrations and drivers' and dealers' licenses. This is an increase of \$5,863,760 over 1914, and an increase of 734,325 in the number of vehicles registered. Automobile fees now defray nearly 7 per cent of the total amount spent on rural road and bridge buildings, whereas in 1906 the income from this source was less than three-tenths of one per cent of the total expenditure.

By 1915, however, the number had jumped to the figure given, so that there is slightly more than one car registered for each of the 2,375,000 miles of road outside of the incorporated towns and cities.
