80 MILE GALE RAGING THROUGH THE SOUTH

Washington, July 6.—Communica-
tion with Mobile and Pensacola has
been completely stopped since yester-
day morning, the weather bureau ad-
mitted. Shortly before 10 o'clock a
terrible 80-mile gale was blowing. The
wireless is not workable.

A New Orleans wireless this after-
noon from a boat on Mobile Bay said
the hurricane had caused considerable
property damage in Mobile. There is
no loss of life, and Pensacola is safe.
