CHANGES IN TRAIN SCHEDULES Sunday, July 9 on the OREGON ELECTRIC RY.

Effective Sunday, July 9, a new time-table on the Oregon Electric Railway will be issued with the following changes:

Train No. 65 between Salem and Eugene and trains 63 and 64 between Woodburn and Salem will be annulled.

Train No. 1 will leave Portland at 6:30 a. m., Salem 8:35 a. m., running through to Eugene, arriving at Eugene at 10:55 a. m.

Train No. 9, leaving Portland 2:05 p. m., will arrive at Salem 4:15 p. m., Eugene, 6:35 p. m. (This train will be about 10 minutes earlier at all intermediate stations.)

Train No. 14 will leave Salem 1:50 p. m., instead of 1:45 p. m.

Train No. 5, Eugene Limited, will leave North Bank Station at 8:30 a. m., instead of 8:25 a. m. The time at schedule stops and arriving at Eugene will be approximately the same as at present.

Train No. 16 will leave Eugene five minutes later than at present, 1:55 p. m.

Train No. 20 from Corvallis will arrive at North Bank Station at 7:40 p. m., instead of 7:50 p. m.

Trains between Gray and Corvallis and between Woodburn and West Woodburn will be changed to make direct connections with the main line trains.

For changes in time at intermediate stations for different trains, consult agents and secure new time cards to be distributed Saturday.

Spring, April 2, 1845 she married Henry Helmick, and next day started for Oregon. About fifty wagons in the train, captained by a man named McDonald. They came down the Columbia river on a raft, while the cattle were driven around by the Barlow trail. The wagons and goods were on rafts and their raft split and Mr. Moore was drowned. The Helmicks lost all they had, but came on to Tualatin Plains, where they stayed for a short time. Came to Salem in December of 1846. There was just four houses there—Missionary Judson in the missionary house; another man that had a turning lathe made the first chairs she had in Oregon. The fall of 1846 they moved to Polk county, Oregon, on their donation land claim, which she still owns near Parker. There were four sons and one daughter born to this family. One son and his wife live with the aged mother in Albany. The daughter, Mrs. Ledren, lives at Corvallis. The others have died. There are six grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. Mr. Helmick died June 1, 1877. Then she moved to Albany in the fall of 1878, where she has resided at Seventh and Baker streets. She has been blind for the last eleven years, but very cheerful and enjoys her friends' company and also to have the late books and daily papers read to her. Her birthday was celebrated at her home with the son and wife and four granddaughters and one grand son and some friends making fifteen in number sitting at the table with ninety-three candles lighted and small flags as favors.
