WONDERFUL FEAT.

Marvelous progress has been made in the world when it is possible for an ocean steamer to cross the Atlantic through the waters of the enemy and land with a big cargo on the American coast. Such has just been done by Germany, a wonderful aquatic feat. The boat is submersible, and as such whenever it sees a steamer of an enemy, it simply dodges down under the water and continues its way forward unobserved and unsuspected. Being unarmed, it is simply a merchantman, and subject to the rules that govern such boats. Knowing that it is making the trip the wonder will be whether it can return to Germany without accident or adventure, and whether such a service can be made a permanent one. The people of this country cannot help admiring a feat, in a way helping to overcome a tremendous handicap in the present war.

IN INTEREST OF HUMANITY.

Men who see the highest and best in civilization must admire the president for his splendid humanitarian policy in the treatment of Mexico. It is one that appeals to people of higher ideals, desiring the betterment of humanitarian conditions. No matter what the motive it is above politics. No one has a right to impugn the motives of the president, for he has shown from the beginning that he is a man of strong vertebrae, fearless for whatever he considers right. The masses know that this whole Mexican squabble has been brought about by big landed and oil interests in Mexico for the purpose of securing intervention that shall result in their own pecuniary advantage, willing to see some of the best blood of the country spilled in their interest. They know that the utterances of the jingoists and yellow journals are only for political effect in the interest of spoils that go with political victory. They know that however weak Mexico is, it is entitled to its sovereignty, and that it is the business of the United States as a great nation not to jump upon it like a rat terrier upon his prey; but as a brother nation that is entitled to help and not vengeance. It is plain that the Mexicans have misunderstood the situation, and that they had reasons to believe the United States had sinister motives in sending soldiers within her borders. We know the United States did not; but many of them have thought so. No great blessing can come to this country than the escape from war, small or big, and every effort put forth with this in view is entitled to the earnest support and endorsement of the people and not inconsistent grumbles for political effect.

ROOSEVELT'S CRUELTY.

The New York Times, in a recent editorial thus discusses Colonel Roosevelt's desertion of his party:

Tenderly but inexorably Mr. Roosevelt draws his cruel steel along the throat of the Bull Moose. He introduced it to the political fauna. Now he bids it to join the dod. The animal was his. For him it must die. He is the most gregarious of men. He is unhappy in a minority. His letter to the Progressive National committee might aptly be entitled "I Must Get Back Into the Republican Party." Sealed bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12th, 1916 for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the lamp hole at the Eastern end of the lateral sewer now in place in the Santiam Road and extending in a southeasterly direction along said Santiam Road a distance of 320 feet, in Hackleman's Heir's 1st Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the character and ordinances of said City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder of said city, where the plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained. Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12, 1916.

No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$100.00 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of November, 1916, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 per day for each day of delay beyond that period.
