THE PROGRESSIVES.

The action of the Progressives at Seattle shows very decidedly that all the Progressives are not going to be made a puppet of Roosevelt. At a meeting there this week they made the following statement:

"The time has come when the Progressives of this state must step out and show their true colors.

"We organized and fought for certain principles; we abandoned our old party affiliations because we believed that a man who would not leave his party for the good of his country should be forced to leave his country for the good of all parties.

"We stood for social and industrial justice; we wanted the world to pour its treasures into the hands of the many and not have all the good things of life held by the few; we wanted children to be free to play in the sun and go to school, and not toil their lives out in the factories; we wanted the people themselves to rule; we wanted a real direct primary, and real government of the people, for the people, and by the people.

"We went to war and fought bravely; we chose for our leaders men whom we believed we could trust; we fought the fight, and fought hard.

"Into our ranks crept the ever-present office-seeker—the half-witted, skim-milk Progressive, whose only thought is of himself. His idea of heaven is a place where he and his friends are permanently on the payroll; his idea of service is to attend a banquet occasionally and hold office perpetually.

"Another danger was that our party was financed by Wall Street Perkins, who never forgot (although we did) his antecedents.

"Of Theodore Roosevelt, we have naught to say, except that he broke his pledged word when he said: 'I will never desert the men and women who have fought the fight with me.' Today we have the edifying spectacle of Taft and Roosevelt, Barnes and Johnson, Penrose and Colby, and Ed. Sims, J. W. Bryan and W. M. Whitney, Miles Poindexter and William E. Humphrey all joining in a quavering office-seeking chorus: 'We want Hughes. We want Hughes.'

"We don't know who is going to be fooled. Will it be Wall street, or will it be the people? Will Hughes represent Roosevelt's ideas, or Taft's? The history of the past shows that Wall street and Morgan, Taft and Crane, Penrose, Barnes, Humphrey, Sims et al. usually win when there is any doubt.

"We have confronting us a choice: Whom shall we support, Hughes or Wilson?

"At the best, we must admit that Hughes is a trimmer, or he could not herd together, even under the office-seekers' tent, the above heterogeneous mass of patriots."

"How about Wilson?"

"Wilson has proven himself to have patience, tenacity, and a love for peace. Mistakes he has made, and who does not make them? But, deep down under the crust of partisanship, there is a valiant and sturdy Progressive spirit that will not let him go far wrong.

"President Wilson placed on the supreme court bench the first Progressive in our time—a man who has been well called 'The People's Lawyer.' We speak of Brandeis. Brandeis is probably the best versed man in economics who has ever secured a seat on the bench of the nation.

"President Wilson forced through congress the Alaska railroad bill, which means so much to the state of Washington.

"He demanded that Wall street stop robbing our government on armor plate, and we will build our own armor plate plant.

"He has paid more attention to our navy yard than any Republican president who ever sat in the White House.

"He has given more attention to

rural credits in four years than was given by all White House occupants in forty. He forced through congress our present banking law—not perfect, it is true, but a fundamental improvement over the old, as all now admit. He opened the treasury to finance the movement of crops instead of Wall Street stocks, as in days gone by.

"He kept us out of war. He does not believe in war unless it becomes impossible, with honor, to have peace. Perhaps your boy would have been buried on a foreign soil long since if Wilson had not been president. Look over the United States, and we find no weeping wives or children, no impoverished widows, no empty seats at the table on account of war.

"Hughes may be for the people; Wilson is of the people.

"Hughes' voice is raised, before election, in their behalf; Wilson has been tried and proven. No Wall street crowd can awe him; no Barnes or Penrose can handle him. He is our president.

"Let all true Progressives stand by President Wilson."

Scaled bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12th, 1916 for the construction of an eight inch lateral sewer beginning at the lamp hole at the Eastern end of the lateral sewer now in place in the Santiam Road and extending in a southeasterly direction along said Santiam Road a distance of 330 feet, in Hackleman's Heir's 1st Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the character and ordinances of said City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the Recorder of said city, where the plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m. July 12, 1916. No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$100.00 for the faithful performance of the work within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of November, 1916, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 per day for each day of delay beyond that period.
