PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

Portland, July 10.—Receipts were fairly liberal today with an excellent price outlet. Best steers sold as high as \$8.50 and cows at \$7. Even very common steers brought close to the \$8 mark and taking the market as a whole, excellent strength and advances were prevalent in all classes.

Hogs.—An advancing hog market on little heavier receipts was a feature of the day. Top hogs sold at \$8.90 an advance of 30 cents over last week. Bulk sales \$8.70 to \$8.80. Market closed strong.

Sheep.—Sheep prices were well in line with last week. Top lambs were \$8.25 and all others classed in line with former prices. Market closed steady.

EUGENE GOT CONTRACT.

Register.—Two contracts to furnish brick and hollow tile for Roseburg's new federal postoffice and high school buildings have been secured by the Fairmount Brick and Tile company of this city, according to W. E. Field, member of the firm.

The contract for the federal building is the larger of the two, the contract calling for a half-million brick and three carloads of hollow tile.

The bid was secured by the local firm in competition with Portland, Salem, Albany and other cities. "Portland was after it hard and declared they would bear any figure we could make," said Mr. Field last night.

AT SAN DIEGO.

Another record was established at the Panama California International exposition at San Diego Tuesday, July 4, when 45,259 persons visited the exposition grounds. Another feature of 1916 attendance worthy of note in this connection, is that the record held before that time was one made during 1916 when a few hundred less than 45,000 were on the grounds. In the face of statements that the 1916 exposition is doomed to failure and cannot repeat the success of 1915, the actual figures show that from the re-opening in 1916 until midnight of July 4, the 1916 attendance is 28,516 greater than for the same period last year.

The total attendance from March 18, 1915, to July 5, was 620,191. The total from this same date to July 5, 1916, is 648,707.

U. O. SUMMER SCHOOL SHOWS BIG INCREASE

Among Students Are a Couple From Albany and One From Lebanon.

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 12.—Mary Jane Lines, of Albany, is one of the students registered for the summer session of the University of Oregon. She is taking courses in Sociology under Professor Robbins; also courses in Psychology and Physical Education. Other students from Linn County are Carmen Swanson, of Lebanon, and Ruth T. Chase, of Albany.

The University Summer School this year shows an increase in attendance of more than 66 per cent over last year, and more than 100 per cent over the year before, constituting one of the most rapid gains in size in such a short period ever made by an old established institution in the state. The summer school has been in existence eleven years, but its great spurt in growth dates, like that of other departments of the university, from the time of the withdrawal of the Oregon educational institutions from the field of politics, and from the establishment of a high standard of graduate work in all the summer courses.

The summer students are said to average more than 30 years of age, many of them being successful men and women in many lines of work.

Numerous married couples are registered this year, husbands and wives taking work together. The overwhelming majority of the students are Oregonians, but the following states are represented: Washington, California, Idaho, Montana, Iowa, Kentucky, Arizona, Kansas, and the province of New Brunswick. The most distant student comes from Amoy, South China.

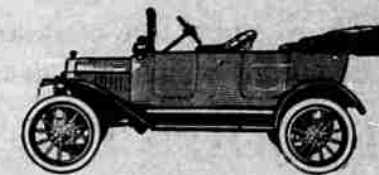
