FRANKLIN MILLER WRITES OF LIFE IN BORDER CAMP

Albany Boy With Salem Company Thinks Soldiers Will Be Coming Home Soon.

Franklin J. Miller, Jr., who is with Company M, Third Oregon, is one of the first to write to relatives in Albany since the mobilization of the soldiers to the border. Mrs. A. B. Coates, his sister, is in receipt of a letter dated San Ysidro, Calif., July 7. He says in part:

"The weather down here is nothing to complain of. The sun shines every day, but there is generally a strong sea breeze that takes most of the sting out of it. Everything that has not water on it, is dry and dusty, the hills are barren and covered with dry grass, stickers and sand burrs. The water is hard and soap curdles in it. The water we drink must be boiled and then it is the worst tasting stuff imaginable.

"We get mail twice a day, and every one looks for a letter and is disappointed if they do not find one. The papers come very irregularly, but are read eagerly when they do arrive.

"The Fourth of July here was not much different than any other day except that we had more food than usual. I was on guard the night before and also on the Fourth. Was also on guard last night and today. Guard duty is not so hard, but one gets awfully tired before he is relieved.

"When we work and drill we work hard, and when time for rest comes one is not over zealous and hunts for the line of least resistance. There are so many little things that one has or ought to do, and if one does them all, he is busy all the time.

"We are going to move soon. I do not know where, but rumors have us going to many parts of the world, and until we move we won't know where for certain. The Thirty-eighth cavalry, which was encamped here for about a week, moved to Calexico a few days ago. There isn't any danger of fighting here and I think we will be coming home soon.

"Some hotel man passed out a lot of his stationery while we were on the train, and most of the boys have used their portion already.

"Give my regards to all my friends."

Pitcairn Island.
Pitcairn Island is in latitude 25 degrees 3 minutes south and longitude 130 degrees 6 minutes west, or almost exactly south of Vancouver Island, and just a little south of the tropic of Capricorn. It was first settled in 1790 by nine mutineers from the English ship Bounty and eighteen natives of Tahiti. By the year 1808, when the island was discovered by the English, the population had grown to sixty-six persons, who formed a model community under the patriarchal government of John Adams, the only surviving mutineer, who had saved a Bible from the ship and was ruling with wisdom and justice his little kingdom of slightly over two miles in length. The island now has over 200 population.—Christian Herald.

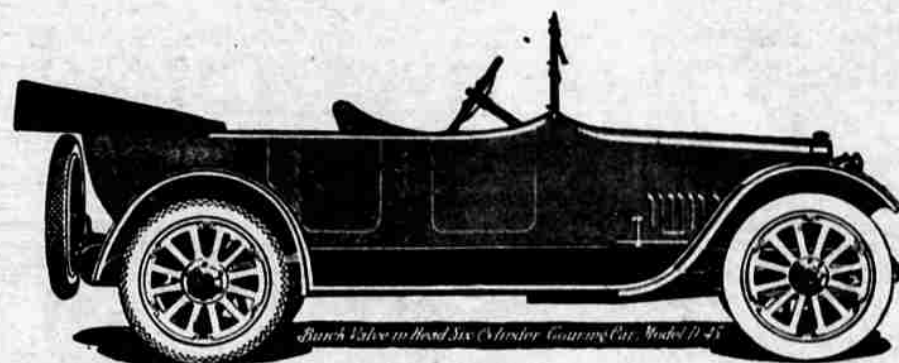

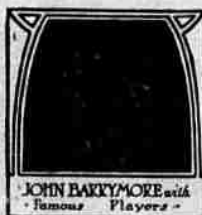
