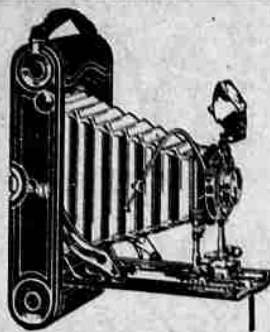

INJUNCTION FILED AGAINST TEARING OUT HUB THEATRE

Suit to Enjoin the Tearing Out
of Front of Building
Filed.

An injunction was filed in the circuit court here today by E. Ruth Barrett to enjoin C. W. Searls from tearing down and remodeling the front of the building formerly occupied by the Hub theatre. The complaint states that on June 1, 1912, defendant leased the building for theatre purposes for a term of five years, but on July 3, 1916, before expiration of the lease, defendant asked to vacate property and was allowed to do so upon placing the building in its former condition. Plaintiffs claim that by changing the front of the building they will be unable to lease it again and ask that work be stopped on it.
