SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

The European problem is no nearer solution this Saturday night than a week ago, so far as the surface outlook goes. The awful slaughter goes on, and no one knows how or where to let go. It is difficult to contemplate the finish. Under the present system, slow and scientific things have been figured down almost to a mathematical conclusion. To the writer temporary gains signify very little. In some way they seem to be counter-balanced by the other side and the fight goes on interminably. How long, oh, how long?

The United States is basking in the sunshine of peace, so far as its relationship with Mexico is concerned, as well as the rest of the world; but no one can tell what a day will bring forth, and, almost any time something may occur which shall set the country in a turmoil. It is to be hoped not, though, and, with the master hand now at the helm, the outlook is certainly good for continued peace.

The past week has seen a marvelous feat in seamanship, a merchant submarine, crossing the ocean past the enemies' waters, where they were supposed to reign supreme, reaching the United States in safety with a valuable cargo. Absolutely unarmed our country has done well to treat the boat as a merchant marine. It has been very inconsistent for England to ask that the boat be declared militant and interned. Recently it insisted on its own boats, though armed, being called merely merchantmen. The people of the United States generally are greatly admiring this wonderful accomplishment, which offers wonderful possibilities in navigation.

In American politics an interesting game is being played to find some line of attack against Wilson; but so far they have been mostly back-acting, some of them childish. One paper, for instance, which has been rampant for a great preparedness, now throws up the cost made for preparation against the government, and slurs at a deficit necessarily made because of war conditions and greater expense accounts. The people, though, understand pretty well the situation, and are not being fooled.

Albany's Chautauqua for 1916 is about closed. It has been a good one, though lacking any remarkable features. An institution for both instruction and entertainment, it has done well. The speakers have been good ones, with up-to-date messages, calling for consideration, and the music has been excellent, offering a variety. It is always customary and easy to criticize, and music especially, always gets stabbed; but the average person in an audience accepts the general effect and doesn't go behind the curtain. The class work has been good. Dr. Bell's conduct of the Bible has been different from anything heretofore offered. In his consideration of Christianity as a live, every-day force in the world, for present needs and the betterment of mankind, as well as for eternity, he has undoubtedly served his audiences well and faithfully. The prevalence of Chautauquas on every side, almost every small town now having one, is seriously handicapping the business of a Chautauqua like that of Albany, and undoubtedly there will have to be new methods and new arrangements.

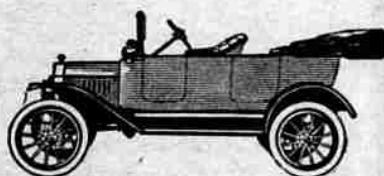
