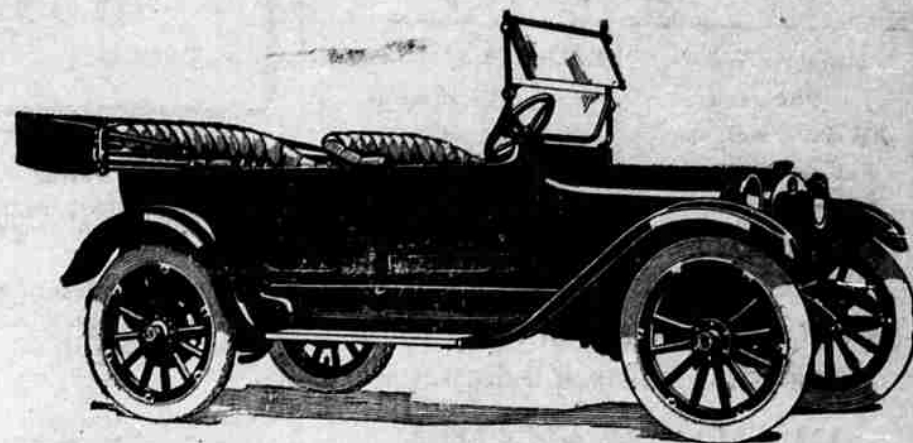
Mrs. W. G. Stanford and daughter, Marion, left for California this week. They will spend several weeks at the south and while there will visit Los Angeles.
