PETERSON BUTTE HIGHEST
THIS SIDE THE CASCADES

Some Interesting Figures Giving Different Heights Around Albany.

Very often I receive inquiries as to the height of some of our most prominent buttes, and thinking it a matter that many of your readers might be interested in, I have compiled from the report of the U. S. geological survey the list which follows. It covers all the most prominent land marks in this part of the valley, and can be relied upon as being accurate. Cut it out and paste it in your scrap book.

Hale's butte, on the right coming south from Jefferson, 427 feet; Meeker's mountain, on the left coming south from Jefferson, 520 feet; Knox butte, four miles northeast of Albany, 634 feet; Peterson, or Washington butte, 14 miles southeast of Albany, 1430 feet; Sand Ridge, a spur of Peterson butte, 350 feet; Ward's butte, 6 miles north of Brownsville, 852 feet; Saddle butte, 2 miles east of Shedd, 646 feet; Powell hills, 2 miles northwest of Brownsville, 516 feet; Union Point, immediately south of Brownsville, 450 feet; Twin butte, between Brownsville and Rowland, 508 feet; Indian Head, near Rowland, 1294 feet; Bond butte, near Rowland, 500 feet.

BANK FIGURES SHOW
GENERAL GAIN IN N. W.

Increase in Amount of Money in Three Cities Reported Is Striking.

Portland, July 18.—The manner in which financial conditions have improved in the Northwest is shown by the statements of banks in three leading cities, as follows:

Portland—Bank clearings January 1 to June 1, 1916 increased \$10,405,667 over the same period of 1915. An increase in deposits of \$7,865,709 for Portland and \$12,693,421 for the entire state is shown between January 1 and May 1. Loans and discounts increased \$4,905,120. Of 32 saloon buildings vacated January 1 all but 21 have been occupied.

Seattle—Clearings for the first six months of 1916 were \$350,349,975 as against \$296,497,079 for the same period in 1915.

Spokane—Deposits in 13 Spokane banks in June, 1916, were \$37,702,459 as against \$30,997,558 in June, 1915. Clearings for the same period "showed substantial increases over the same period in 1915."
