PORTLAND WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REPORT

Yesterday's market opened with one
of the heaviest offerings of cattle ever
received at these yards. A total of
2300 head were received. There was a
good demand for prime heavy steers.
First sales on this class looked steady
to 10c lower. Choice light steers found
as good market as did the heavies.
Choice light steers sold up to \$8.00.
Other grades of steers were from 20
to 40c off. Choice light cows lost
another quarter yesterday. Best sell-
ing at \$6. Common to fair cows 50c
lower. Heifers sold at \$6.35 for a
choice load.

Sheep prices were unchanged as has
been the case for some time. Choice
lambs sold at \$8.25. Yearlings and
wethers at 6c. There is a good de-
mand for choice ewes. Best light ewes
selling at \$5 to \$5.50.

vio, who led the slaughter and the in-
surrection, had taken the oath of al-
legiance to the United States and had
been commissioned as a major of the
Macabebe scouts. One day Rhodes
was walking near the hospital taking
fresh air when he saw two Filipino
carabou drivers in an argument as
they unloaded sump at a store. Shei-
vio, a pompous, cocky, vainglorious
little man, swaggered up to the quar-
reling drivers and struck one. Rhodes
stepped up and pulled Sheivio by the
shoulder, the latter turning and let-
ting out some Spanish epithet slapped
Rhodes on the cheek.

With hardly a thought, Rhodes
turned, grabbed a Krag rifle from a
Macabebe scout who was standing
there, and shoved the butt of the
weapon into the half breed's face. As
he went down Rhodes gave him a
crash on the head that fractured his
skull and killed him instantly.

"It is just what I intended to do
and I have never been sorry for
avenging the death of my 116 com-
rades," said Rhodes this morning.

He was arrested by the sentries, re-
duced to a private and tried by gen-
eral court martial. Twelve army of-
ficers sitting in the court found him
guilty of murder and malice afore-
thought under the jurisdiction of the
U. S. flag, and General Fred D.

Grant, in command of the army in the
Philippines, sentenced him to serve
30 years in federal prison. The court-
martial was conducted by the 12 of-
ficers, one officer being allowed de-
fendant as attorney, and one acting as
judge advocate, or prosecuting attor-
ney. No talking is done, all questions
being written on slips of paper and
answered the same way. "The hardest
and most unfair trial in the world,"
states Rhodes.

He was taken to Bilbid prison,
then removed to Alcatraz Island in
San Francisco bay, then to Leaven-
worth prison and then to Governor's
Island, New York. He conducted him-
self exemplarily, and once a year he
wrote the permitted letter to the
Secretary of war, for 10 years. Then
he was permitted to write twice ask-
ing for a pardon. He kept up hope
and after seeing three administrations
from prison he was finally pardoned
by Woodrow Wilson March 19, 1916.
Now old and broken at 45 he is on his
way back home to Coyote, Cal., and
there he will make his future home.
He will petition the government to
restore him to full citizenship and
standing in the army, and while he is
physically unable to serve, if he is re-
stored to his former position he will
be able to draw back pay as a com-
missary sergeant for the 13 years
that General Grant and the courtmar-
tial board took away from him. With
this money he will be able to live in
peace, and he partly compensated for
his term in prison. He believes in the
government and feels sure that the
stain will not be kept on his life for

killing a murderous half-breed, who
led a massacre on his company of
friends and comrades.
