There is an impression that we have to go east to get almost anything wanted; but as a matter of fact a great many things are made in Oregon, and it is possible to live with the use of home made things. In Portland alone the list is a long one. A recently compiled list will be not only interesting, but a surprise to many:

Cherries in barrels, ammonia, bluing, stoves, brooms, garbage cans, plaster of paris decorations and garden furniture, doors, windows and trimmings, mirrors and beveling, office and store fixtures, women and children's cotton apparel, bedding, mattresses, etc., wooden pipe and tanks, auto and buggy tops, fruit flavers, iron and steel water pipe, gas water heaters, one and two ton trucks, glass signs, brass and copper spinning, jellies, preserves and condiments, box shooks, paste board boxes, noodles, coffee roasting, bolts, tools and dies, maps and blue prints, gloves, knitted goods, extracts, ready to make lumber, grape juice, loganberry juice, baking powder, ice cream powder, neckties and neckwear, soda water, orchard sprayers, fruit picking equipment, such as ladders, grain tanks, edgers and sawmill machinery, self sharpening lawn mowers, ornamental cement stone work, billiard cues and balls, shower bath equipment, artificial limbs, autos, street cars, hearses and delivery cars, twine and rope, drills, fruit evaporators, flour, breakfast foods, steel and wooden ships, furniture, office, home and school, paints and varnishes, auto signal horns, saddles and harness, fire kindlers, immersion heaters, violins, wood preservative, elevators, baskets, nickle plating, fruit and vegetable canning outfits, briquets, pottery and stoneware, concrete brick, curtains and shades, yarn, rubber goods, steel castings, farm machinery, carbon paper, cakets, mens hats and caps, shoes, jewelry baby korals, culverts and flumes, candy wrapping machines safes, animal remedies, linseed oil, ice plants, refrigerators, enamel signs, logging engines, chairs, manufactured house trimmings, brass and steel bedsteads, bed springs, crackers, cookies and cakes, workmen's clothes, blankets and woolens, durable roofing, men's and boys' clothing, millinery, wool bats, shoe button fastener machine, pianos, rugs, pickles and sauer kraut, lead, wool, cement, cigars, honey (artificial), type-writer holders, wood carriers, grain sacks, willow furniture, sportsmen waterproof clothing, furnaces, incubators and brooders, cosmetics, picture films, soap and washing powder, trunks and bags, scientific instruments, sink brackets, auto seats, ice cream cones, wool and cotton waste, saddle trees, tents and awnings, prunes, shears and fruit pickers, motor and other boats.

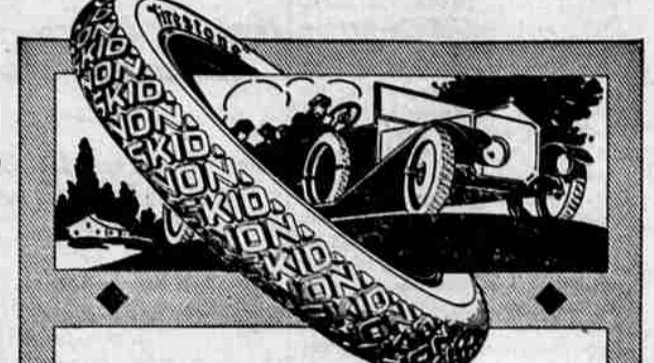
