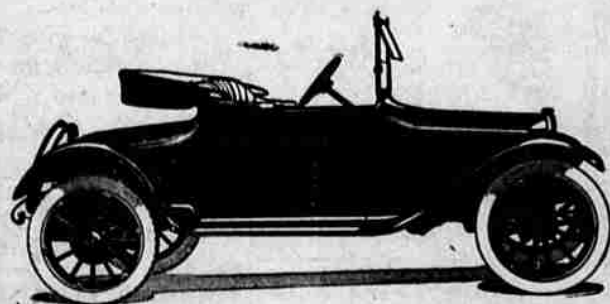

EASTERN OREGON NEEDS ONE NORMAL SCHOOL

Pendleton Putting Up a Good Fight to Secure One For That Part of State.

"Eastern Oregon is asking for nothing but what grows out of a most urgent need in submitting to the voters of the state an initiative amendment establishing a normal school at Pendleton," said M. R. Chessman, a Pendleton newspaper man who was here yesterday in the interests of the measure.

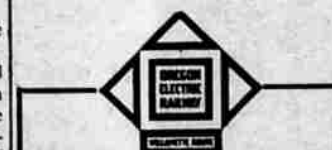
According to Mr. Chessman, Eastern Oregon schools are suffering from the lack of trained teachers. "State Superintendent Churchill's last report shows that there are but 13 per cent of the teachers of the whole state normal trained, and the majority of these are in the Willamette valley," he said in discussing the matter. "Because of the crowded condition of the Monmouth normal and because of its distance from their homes, the majority of normal students of Eastern Oregon are attending Washington or Idaho schools. They are required to teach in Washington following their graduation in order to repay the state and, consequently, we do not, in many cases, receive the services of our home-grown teachers."

"Another hardship visited on Eastern Oregon by the lack of a normal school is the extra salary burden which she has to pay for such teachers as she does get. The state superintendent reports that Eastern Oregon pays an average of \$10.41 per month per teacher more than does the Willamette valley. This means that we pay \$170,000 a year more than does the Willamette valley for similar services, a sum more than four times the proposed maintenance for the normal school."

"It is out of the question to build up the Monmouth normal to meet the needs of the state because of the smallness of the public schools of that town. The biggest feature of normal training is the practice teaching in the schools and, without this practice teaching, a normal graduate is like a surgeon who begins his practice with a book knowledge only of his profession. There are only five states in the union with normal facilities as poor as Oregon has and, for the voters to withhold longer, another school is neither economy, justice or good sense."

After Progressives and Suffragists.

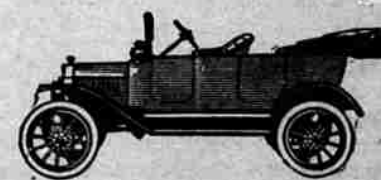
