### FIVE PEOPLE UNDER AUTO IN ACCIDENT

Mrs. Mattie Cahill, of Dayton, Wash. Received Broken Collar Bone Yesterday.

Mrs. Mattie Cahill, of Dayton, Wash., received a broken collar bone and other injuries when an auto driven by Isaac Stevens, of Gervais, Ore., went over the bank yesterday afternoon about 4 o'clock at the C. & E. crossing two miles west of the city. There were three other women in the car who received cuts and bruises, but no serious hurts. Mr. Stevens, an aged man, escaped with hardly a scratch. The occupants of the car were Isaac Stevens, of Gervais, his sisters, Mrs. Mattie Cahill and Mrs. Sarah McCubbin, of Dayton, Wash., and Mrs. Risie Ringe, of Gervais; and their niece, Mrs. J. W. Groshong, of Albany. They arrived here Tuesday to visit relatives in this part of the state and were on their way back to Albany after visiting at the home of W. A. Buckner, near Granger.

As the car passed over the railroad track and started down the hill the oil and water on the road caused the car to skid and when the brake was applied it slid straight ahead and turned over to the left of the road. All were under or partially under the machine. The ambulance and Dr. F. E. Beauchamp were rushed to the place where the accident happened and the injured people cared for. Mrs. Cahill was taken to St. Mary's hospital, where she is being treated. This morning an X-ray picture was taken of her shoulder and one taken of Mrs. McCubbin's ankle, but the full extent of the injuries will not be known until the plates are developed. The rest of the party are getting along without difficulty.

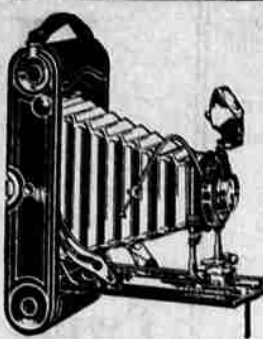

### FIREMEN'S TOURNAMENT TO BE HELD AT CORVALLIS IN SEPT.

The Willamette Valley Firemen's Tournament association will hold its annual meeting this year at Corvallis on September 5 and 6. All entries for the contests must be made by August 15th.

The Corvallis fire department invites every department in the state to join the contests. Besides the races and contests, several of the best posted men in the country will attend and who will be invited to speak on fire protection, fire prevention and fire fighting. The social side of the meeting has not been overlooked as arrangements have been made for a reception, banquet and grand ball.

Teams will be allowed to run with their own equipment or will be furnished with equipment on request. Hose must be the standard 50 foot length, standard thickness and with the regulation full thread service coupling. Nozzles are to be not less than six inches in length.

The races are to include what is termed the New York race, which includes a run of 100 yards to a hydrant, and the west test, which gives a run of 100 yards to a hydrant and the laying out of 150 feet of hose.

The third race is known as the hub and hub or race against time in which nine men are allowed to a team. No. 4 is the Siamese race. No. 5, the hose coupling race, and No. 6 is the test of the men in patching a leak in the hose. The two days' sport will also include the following contests: No. 7, hose and ladder; No. 8, ladder race; No. 9, ladder race; No. 10, Horsky box test; No. 11, circulator nozzle; No. 12, water fight, five men to the team; No. 13, 100 yard dash, one man from each department; No. 14, relay race, four men from each department.—Journal.
