

BRITISH CLAIM MORE PROGRESS

In Spite of Violent Opposition
Gen. Haig Declares He
Is Advancing.

RUSSIANS CLAIM A TEUTON RETREAT

German Airships Attacked the
English Coast Dropping
Thirty-two Bombs.

London, July 29.—Germans counter-attacked in Delville woods. Gen. Haig reported two desperate assaults defeated. The Teutons suffered heavily. A hand to hand struggle north and northeast of Delville has continued uninterrupted.

Gen. Haig declared that the British were advancing despite the most violent opposition. Gen. Haig reported several German regiments annihilated around Delville wood.

Petrograd, July 28.—The Russian offensive has forced a Teuton retreat along the whole front from Brody to the Russian capture of Brody is again announced.

London, July 29.—It is announced that three German airships at 1:30 this morning dropped 32 bombs on Lincolnshire and Norfolk, but the damage is immaterial. There were no casualties. Fog hampered the raiders. Anti-aircraft guns repulsed the invaders at one point. It is believed that the Germans attempted to reach Hull, the cruiser base.

Berlin, July 29.—It is announced that strong British attacks in the Potters region failed. It is admitted the Russians penetrated the German lines in the Trysten region, forcing the abandonment of advanced positions beyond Stokhod river.

The Russians developed attacks along the Stokhod northwest of Lutsk. A strong attack north of Sokul was readily repulsed.

Berlin, July 29.—It is announced that a German cruiser captured the British armed steamer Eskimo. They battled an hour southeast of Arendal Thursday.

Ask Clemency.

Washington, July 29.—The senate voted 46 to 19 in favor of passing resolutions asking that Great Britain exercise clemency toward the Irish political prisoners.

There were 17 new deaths, fifteen here and two at Aurora.

Restored Captured Vessel.

Norfolk, July 29.—Federal Judge Waddell today restored the captured British liner Appam to its former owners. He decided against the German prize crew, and held that the German government lost legal claim to the vessel when Lieutenant Berg brought it to American waters.

Albany Man Is Sixth to Head
Grand Lodge Coming From

Grand Chancellor Willard L. Marks left this afternoon for Portland where he will preside next week at the sessions of the grand lodge, Knights of Pythias, which convenes Tuesday simultaneously with the Supreme Lodge. Mr. Marks will attend to matters connected with the opening of the lodge.

Albany has supplied more grand chancellors to the grand lodge than any other city in the state. Six have served. They are H. J. Clark, Geo. W. Hochstedler, and Oliver H. Irvine, all having died; and J. L. Hill, L. M. Curl, and the present grand chancellor, Willard L. Marks. The Albany lodge was the seventh installed in the state and at present is only exceeded in membership by but one of the lodges of Portland.

DOUG. HAMILTON COMMITTED TO THE INSANE ASYLUM

He Attacked Girl on Ellsworth
Street, But Was Stopped
By Woman.

That Doug Hamilton needs looking after seriously was made manifest last evening when he undoubtedly attempted to commit a crime on an eight-year-old girl. The little girl was on her way down Ellsworth street to the Anderson garage to go with relatives on a trip into the country, and had just reached the walk crossing the alley when Doug Hamilton, a notorious character, who was standing there, grabbed the child and started up the alley westward with her, as fast as he could jerk her along. Mrs. Ristine, who is employed at the Sternberg store, happened to see the act from a rear door, or window, and rushing out grabbed the child away from the fellow, and saw that she was in the hands of those waiting for her.

Hamilton's motives were undoubtedly criminal. The matter was reported to the district attorney. The law might not make out of it more than an assault, but the circumstances spoke for more. This afternoon he was taken before Judge McKnight and a commission and examined for insanity. He undoubtedly belongs in the asylum.

The physicians forming the commission were Drs. J. P. Wallace and J. H. Robbott. They found him to be a congenital defective since birth. He was ordered committed to the asylum and an attendant will be here tonight to take him there. He is reported to have attacked other small girls.

For years he has been a joke; but the joke period has passed.

Our Blacklist Case.

MONTHLY SALES DAY HAS GOOD CROWD

Started a Couple Years Ago
These Sales Have Proven a
Clearance Event.

FARMERS BRING MANY THINGS FOR MARKET

This Sale Noticeable For Binders
and Other Farm
Machinery.

The monthly sales day was being held this afternoon, with a good crowd present, and much interest, as usual, in the sales.

These sales which have been running nearly two years have proven quite a drawing card, and there are always an extra number of people here then.

Today the offerings were of a miscellaneous character. Among the things were a couple of binders, that had evidently seen some good use and lots of it, a plow or two, other farm implements, some horses; but no cows were observed.

It is a clearance house for things the farmers have to sell, and a good one.

LEBANON MAN MAKES BIG THING WITH LOGANBERRIES

Thirteen Acres Produces Thirty
Tons of Berries at \$50
a Ton.

Lebanon Criterion: J. Q. Swink, living a few miles northeast of the city, has about finished picking and marketing the crop from a thirteen acre patch of loganberries that he set out last year. This being the first year the crop was not quite so large as usual and yet measured in tons there is a showing that marks the loganberry as a paying crop for the small farmer in this section.

The berries were sold by Mr. Swink to the Albany Fruit Juice company where they have been manufactured into loganberry juice. They brought two and one-half cents per pound at the factory or \$50 per ton, and when the pick is completed it was expected that near thirty tons would have been marketed. This will make approximately \$100 per acre for the crop which is by no means a large yield for the loganberry.

There are several other patches in this part of the county that evidently will be taken care of and put in condition for getting a crop from them next year now that there is a good market close at hand. Indications are that the factory will have a demand for the product far greater than they will be able to supply and next year will see an increased demand for the berries at a better price than is now being paid.

OREGON WILL HAVE GOOD FOOTBALL TEAM

Dr. Straub Says the Freshman
Class at Eugene Will Number
Over 500 Students.

According to "Bill" Snyder and Orville Monteith, who occupied positions at guard and half back on the University of Oregon foot ball team last season, the state "U" will have a great team this year. This is one of the big years for Oregon, an occasion that happens once in a number of years, when all conditions favor a great team. With hardly an exception, the entire team that played last year will be back in college and all will be eligible to play. According to Asst. Manager Geary, who was in Eugene a few days ago, every man made his required number of hours in college work, the standard by which men are eligible these days. Besides, a number of preppers with ability will be in the Oregon ranks, and, while they will not be able to play this year on account of conference rules, they will make fine nucleus for the next year. There are a number of good men in last year's second string and freshman squad who will make varsity material this year.

At the meeting of the Northwest Conference in Portland last December a rule was adopted which prohibits freshmen from playing on the varsity team, or any man who has not been in college at least a year. Oregon will be least affected of any this fall, for she will have more veterans in uniform than any other college in the Northwest. Oregon has a chance to grab the Northwest and Pacific Coast flag, and it would be surprising if she does not do it.

Dr. John Straub, veteran teacher of the University, passed through Albany this morning, and stated that there will be a freshman class of 500 at the state university this fall. Large numbers are coming from high schools in Eastern Oregon, and from all parts of the state. It looks like a good year all around for the university.

It is remarkable heavy for grey oats and will thresh out a big yield. The grain is well filled and looks fine. This was grown in a 12 acre field with vetch. It was planted in February.

Press He Gave It Out
Pointedly.

A PAPAL STATEMENT TO AMERICAN PEOPLE

He Prays That Innocent Children's
Prayers Be Heard on
Second Anniversary.

New York, July 29.—The United Press has received the following from the pope through Cardinal Gasparri: "Rome to the United Press: I presented your telegram to the holy father. His holiness is grateful for your respect and confidence in the Holy See. He prays that the Lord of Mercies be moved by the prayers of innocent children imploring peace on the second anniversary of the terrible conflict, may speedily end the awful carnage. Signed Gasparri."

The telegram replied to a United Press cablegram, asking the pope's statement on the second war anniversary. The cablegram requested a "papal statement to the American people."
