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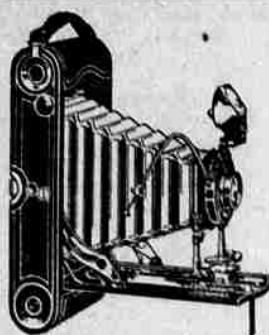

PORTLAND GETTING READY FOR ITS BUYERS WEEK

Will Last From August 7 to August 12 Filled With Entertainment.

Plans are going rapidly ahead for the celebration of Buyers' Week in Portland, August 7 to 12.

The executive committee handling the event has just determined upon the general plan for the entertainment features incidental to the Fourth annual event. In arranging the various forms of entertainment, it was decided to utilize the experience of previous years in ascertaining the kind and nature of entertainment most desirable and most enjoyable by the hundreds of buyers who will be guests in Portland at that time.

The tentative schedule of entertainment for the week includes a general reception Monday evening, August 7, at the Portland Chamber of Commerce. This will be informal in character as well as will all other features of the buyers week entertainment.

Tuesday evening, the ladies attending Buyers' Week will be entertained under the auspices of the Ladies' Reception Committee, probably at some Portland theatre. The men will be entertained at a big smoker in the main dining room of the Portland Chamber of Commerce. This smoker will include, in addition to refreshments, a varied line of snappy and entertaining features on the program.

Wednesday noon, the Portland Ad Club will conduct a Buyers' Week day at their regular noonday luncheon. The chief entertainment feature proposed for this event will be a two minute competitive speech boosting the laurels of their home communities by some of the visitors present. This is a feature which was originated as a part of buyers' week four years ago. Suitable prizes are offered the winners by jobbing and manufacturing firms participating in the invitation. It is proposed that Wednesday night will be utilized as a general theatre party, when all those present will be given a free show.
