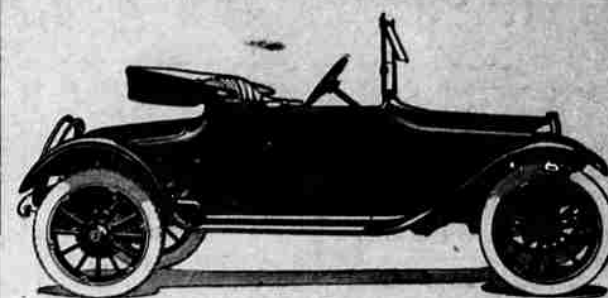
Returned from Portland—
