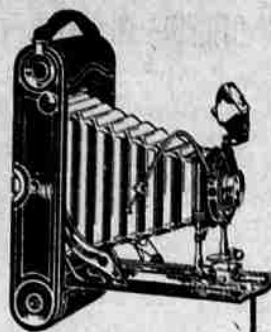

Nation's Osteopaths Meet—Have New Knifeless Cure for Cataract.

Kansas City, Aug. 1.—Twilight sleep, hay fever, cataract, and catarrhal deafness were among the important subjects on the program of the twentieth annual meeting of the American osteopathic association which has opened a week's session here.

Dr. R. H. Dunnington of Philadelphia will announce the details of his discovery of an osteopathic method of curing cataract without surgery.

Pressure anesthesia will be demonstrated. Clinics will be conducted in curing catarrhal deafness. Prevention of infant mortality will be considered by the women's department.

Portland Stock Yard Market.

Cattle—With another heavy offering of cattle yesterday, the market was extremely slow. Prime steers were as much as 25 to 50 cents lower.

Top steers sold at \$7.50 which would have easily brought \$8 a week ago. Very good steers sold at \$6.75 to \$7. Bulk of steers went around \$6.50. The medium and fair grades sold steadily with a week ago. The most of this class went \$5.00 to \$6.50. Cows as a rule sold at about the same loss. A few sold for \$5.50 but the most of prime cows went \$5.00 to \$5.15. Bulk of cows sold around \$4.00 to \$4.50. Bulls sold steady to a shade higher with last week. Best bulls sold steady to a shade higher with last week. Best bulls realized \$4.75 against a top of \$4.50 last week. Calves were steady with a \$7.50 top.

Hogs—The hog market showed another sharp advance yesterday when prices were 20 to 30 cents over last week's close. There was but a light run and buyers were eager. Tops sold at \$9.35 with the bulk selling \$9.25 and \$9.30.

Sheep—There was a good demand for all sheep offerings at steady prices yesterday. Choice lambs sold at \$8.25 with culls going at \$5.50 and \$6.00. Yearlings selling \$6.00 and \$6.25 and ewes at \$5.00.

THE SLAVE PROBLEM OF ANTI-BELLUM DAYS

Historical Scenes Truthfully
Portrayed in "The Birth
of a Nation."

The slave trade in America, and slavery as it existed prior to the war is exemplified in "The Birth of a Nation." D. W. Griffith's pictorial and musical elaboration of Thomas Dixon's "The Clansman" and "The Leopard's Spots."

This phase of political conditions is traced strikingly from the importation of the first slaves to the troubles that grew out of their freedom and consequent enfranchisement and subsequent tribulations of the South under carpet-bag rule.

As a sort of prologue to the drama, the arrival of the first "cargo" of slaves is presented with historic fidelity. From this the scene changes to ante bellum days, depicting the condition of the negro in the south at that time. Then comes the turmoil of war, and, finally, the rule of black over white with a mulatto lieutenant governor in the capitol of South Carolina and the Ku Klux Klan riding through the country-side to rescue their women and preserve their traditions.

Lincoln signing the proclamation is a favorite among the 5000 odd scenes of the mighty spectacle.

TRACTOR FARMING.

Big Demonstration Started Today
Near Kinlock, in Suburbs
of St. Louis.

St. Louis, Aug. 1.—The first practical demonstration of tractor farming ever held in the Mississippi valley is in progress at Kinlock, in St. Louis county, where for five days the latest power-driven agricultural implements will be demonstrated on a two thousand acre farm.

Under the auspices of the National Tractor Farming association, harrowing, plowing, seeding, spreading, pulverizing, threshing and harvesting will take up the morning sessions. Each afternoon forty power-driven plows will tear up the ground. The dynamometer tests of draw bar pull of the various makes of plows attracted considerable attention as did the belt-work exhibit.
