PURSES INCREASED AT THE PENDLETON ROUND-UP

Biggest One For the Cowboys' Relay Race, the Roundup Classic.

Pendleton, Aug. 3.—Increasing the purse in the Cowboy's relay race, the Round-Up classic, to \$1000, the cowboys' bucking contest to \$800, the cowgirls' relay race to \$750, the steer roping to \$750 and other events in proportion the Round-Up announces one of the biggest cash prize lists ever offered for the 1916 show, September 21, 22 and 23. In addition to the money prizes there will be the usual high class saddles and other trophies in the various events.

One added feature this year which has never been put on before at any exhibition in the northwest will be the goat roping contest, for which a cash prize of \$250 is provided.

The complete prize lists is as follows: Cowboy's pony race, \$150; squaw race, \$150; cowboys relay \$1,000; bulldogging \$200; cowboy standing race, \$150; cowgirls bucking, \$250; Indian pony relay, \$300; Indian pony, \$150; steer roping, \$750; goat roping, \$250; maverick race, \$30; cowgirls' pony race, \$150; stage coach race \$200; pony express, \$200; cowgirl's relay, \$750; Indian pony race, \$150; cowboys' bucking, \$800; tug of war, \$22; wild horse race, \$150.

O. & C. GRANT LANDS.

Register of Land Office at Roseburg Makes a Public Statement.

In a circular letter the register of the U. S. land office at Roseburg, says:

This letter is intended as reply to the many letters of inquiry coming to this office, relative to the Oregon & California railroad grant lands.

A list of these lands, by township and range in the several counties within the Roseburg land district, will be mailed to any one requesting such list, for any particular county, or the lists for the entire district will be sent if desired.

Based on the list of lands given in the decree of the court, the approximate acreage of unsold railroad lands in the several counties of this district, at the time the suit was instituted, was as follows:

Lincoln, 1040; Benton, 27,216; Linn, 14,620; Lane, 300,110; Douglas, 607,360; Coos, 100,620; Curry, 8,400; Josephine, 172,460; Jackson, 444,560; Klamath, 13,440. Total, 1,690,326.

In addition to the above lands there are other railroad lands in several of the counties named, that at the time the suit was instituted were unsurveyed, and hence not included in the list given in the suit, but coming as well under the decree.

This office has no map for distribution, but will furnish township plats showing location of all vacant land and unsold railroad land, at \$1.00 per township. In ordering township plats, both the range and township number must be given, and remittance should

Advertisement for Sewer Construction.

Scaled bids will be received by the Council of the City of Albany, Oregon, until 7:30 o'clock p. m., August 9th, 1916, for the construction of an eight-inch lateral sewer beginning at the manhole in the Oak St. trunk sewer between 1st and 2nd streets and running thence eastward through Block 16 in Hackleman's Third Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 282 feet.

Said sewer construction to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Albany and the plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer on file in the office of the recorder of the said city, where the plans may be seen and specifications and estimates obtained.

Bids will be opened at 7:30 o'clock p. m., August 9th, 1916. No proposal or bid will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check payable to the City of Albany in an amount equal to five per cent. of the aggregate bid to be forfeited as fixed and liquidated damages in case the bidder neglects or refuses to enter into a contract and provide an approved bond in the sum of \$150 for the faithful performance of said contract; said work to be begun within ten days after notification of awarding of contract to such bidder.

All bids must be made with a view of completing the construction of said sewer prior to the 1st day of September 1916, under a liquidated penalty of \$2.50 per day for each day of delay beyond that time.

All bids should be addressed to "Recorder of the City of Albany," marked "Proposal for the construction of lateral sewer commencing at the manhole in the Oak Street Trunk Sewer between First and Second streets and running thence eastward through Block 16 in Hackleman's Third Addition to the City of Albany, Oregon, a distance of 282 feet."

DOUGLAS COUNTY LADY COMES TO DALLAS TO HAVE CANCER OF LIP REMOVED

Mrs. Julia Barnes, of Dixonville, seven miles from Roseburg, 170 miles from Dallas, came to this city on July 31st to have Dr. Toel remove a cancer the size of a hazelnut from her lower lip.

Six years ago a grandchild of hers had in play hit her hard on the lip. A lump had formed that stayed. Two years ago a wartlike growth formed on this lump.

As the growth began to trouble her she went two months ago to a physician who gave her a plaster to eat it out. The pain from the eating was however so intense that only once she could keep the plaster on for some time, the other four times she had to remove it in a few minutes as she could not stand the pain.

As the growth got worse right along she finally consulted surgeons in Roseburg who advised her to have it cut out.

Knowing too well of the frequent returns of cancers after the use of the knife she refused to have this done.

Hearing of the very successful electrical operations for cancer as used by Dr. Toel of this city she came here to have him remove it.

Dr. Toel removed the cancer in a single electrical operation without losing any blood in taking the cancer out of the lip.

When Mrs. Barnes was shown the removed cancer by the doctor she was very glad, for as soon as the operation was over there was not the slightest pain, while the cancer before had been very painful on the slightest touch.—Observer.
