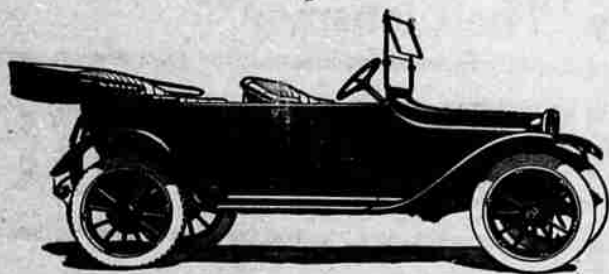

BRIGHT COLORS RAGE ON STATE STREET, CHICAGO

Local Millinery Buyer Home With Latest Style News Seen in Western Metropolis.

Mrs. J. Charles Smith, buyer for the millinery department of the Worth Department Store, returned yesterday from Chicago where she selected the fall line of hats for the women's department. Mrs. Smith reports having had a hot time of it in the East with the thermometer from 100 to 107 degrees in the day time and above 90 at night, with people crowding to the beaches and then not finding relief from the intense heat. She is glad to be back in temperate Oregon.

All through the East business is flourishing and wholesale houses are more independent than they have been for years. Where they used to seek the buyer, she says, they now let the buyer seek them. The war has made such heavy demands on so many materials and the prices have gone up so much that there is a shortage in all lines. Felt for hats, for instance, is high. Wool, demanded for the manufacture of army uniforms for this and foreign countries, has sent the price up to such an extent that, where formerly, the braids were cut out, now the whole fleece is used, and consequently a pure white felt cannot be obtained.

In speaking of styles this year Mrs. Smith states that felt hats of bright colors, also in black and white, are principal things. Velvet is also being used a great deal. Wide brims are the vogue, and the brighter, louder the color the better. Duo tones are also fashionable. One of the novelties is a jockey hat for motor and sport wear. This hat is made like the jockey cap, with a peaked crown and a long bill. They are worn with veils. Veils are in rage for everything.

Instead of the tendency being to lower the skirts this year, Mrs. Smith says that they are shorter if anything. Shorter and broader. The skirts are made short and full with a bustle-like effect which was worn in the early eighties. The bodices of the dresses are tight-fitting. Fur trimmings are being used for both millinery and dresses. Buttons, the more the better, are also being stuck on for trimmings. In speaking of furs Mrs. Smith, one afternoon last week when the heat was 103 in the shade, saw a fashionable lady get out of a motor car on Michigan avenue wearing a large seal skin fur around her neck. One of the cleverest things in dresses was the sport suits. They are made of silk jersey cloth and sell for a high as \$50. They are made with long sport coat effects with full skirt and deep hems. The coats are buttoned up tight to the collar with pearl buttons as large as a dollar all the way up. Bright colors prevail in these. Shoes are getting higher both in price and in the length of tops. The cheapest that a woman can get a fashionable pair of shoes for is \$8, and from that on up. There are no bargain prices seen in the shoe stores said Mrs. Smith.

In stockings, bright shades are continuing. Solid colors of bright hues and bronzes are being worn, matching the shoes and dresses.

In all Mrs. Smith had a very interesting trip and saw lots of interest, both in women's attire and in sights in general.
