GOVERNMENT CROP REPORT SHOWS BIG DECREASE

(By United Press)

Washington, Aug. 8.—Agriculture department forecast is "mediocre crop" about 654,000,000 bushels of wheat. Crop prospects declined 105,000,000 bushels between July first and August first. Last years crop was one billion, twelve million bushels. Other estimates are, corn, two billion, seven hundred seventy-seven million bushels. Last year it was three billion, five million bushels; oats, one billion, five hundred forty million bushels.
