ARRESTED HIMSELF.

North Bend Deputy Marshal Violated Sunday Dance Law and Immediately Enforced It.

Marshfield Times: Will Anderson, son of Marshal Anderson of North Bend, appeared before City Recorder Maybee there this morning, signing a complaint against himself for violating the Sunday dance ordinance, entered a plea of guilty and paid \$5 fine. Anderson was deputy city marshal and said that he was duly authorized to prosecute himself for an offense against the city.

Saturday evening Will Anderson and George McDonald staged a dance at the Simpson pavilion in North Bend. Midnight came too quick and the dancers wanted more with the result that it was about 1 o'clock before the dancing ceased.

Marshal Anderson heard of it yesterday and informed Night Policeman Ollie Smith to enforce the law. Will Anderson heard of his father's orders and recalling that he had been deputized for Saturday evening proceeded to beat his father to it. The city regulations require that an officer be present at the pavilion dances to keep order.

All Women Must Be Free.

Colorado Springs, Colo., Aug. 10.—"Until all the women of the United States are free, none of them are free," declared Mrs. Florence Bayard Hillis of Wilmington, Del., here for the conference of the National Woman's Party. Mrs. Hillis is a Democrat and the daughter of the late Thomas Bayard, secretary of state under Cleveland and this country's first ambassador to Great Britain.

After reciting how at the first hearing of the Congressional Union before the House judiciary committee "the chairman and some of the members characterized their actions by ill breeding, discourtesy and gross injustice," Mrs. Hillis said:

"The sooner the women of this country, more than half who are unrepresented in government, awaken to the fact that this is the kind of unjust treatment to which their most vital interests are subjected, the sooner will there rise, as indeed it has arisen,

a tide of action that will put an end to such tactics. Individual liberty is the essential basis of free government, and under our form of government both political expediency and political justice demand the national enfranchisement of women. Until all the women of this country are free, one of them are free.

The hopeless task of state referendums has taught women the necessity for concentration on the federal amendment. Undoubtedly enough states are now won to enable the most skeptical observer to see that the political power already in the hands of women themselves is sufficient to win freedom for all women."
