COLUMBIA RIVER FESTIVAL

ASTORIA'S ANNUAL REGATTA.

Besides Boat Races, San Joan Hill, a Spectacle, Will Be Presented.

Astoria, Or., Aug. 11.—The dates of Astoria's big annual water and carnival event, have been set for September 1, 2, 3, 4, 1916. This year the Regatta enters on its twenty-first anniversary, and its promoters are preparing to celebrate its arrival at majority with more than ordinary vivacity.

In addition to the annual championship speed boat races of the Pacific International Power Boat Association, and races for fishing boats (both power and sail), there will be numerous aquatic and land sports, a splendid military spectacle—"The Battle of San Juan Hill"—participated in by the regulars of the United States army, and veterans from the camps of the Spanish-American War Veterans, and numerous social functions.

A new and distinguishing feature of the week will be the "Homecoming" of former residents of Astoria and vicinity, to whom invitations are being sent far and wide. In this connection Chairman F. C. Harley states that he will be grateful for the names and addresses of such former residents, mailed to his office, 11th and Duane streets, Astoria, to whom formal invitations will be sent; but he especially states that all former Astorians who may see this notice will please consider themselves and families invited.

Extensive plans are forming for the "Admiral's and Queen's Ball," Friday night, September 1, which it is proposed to make the "most brilliant social event ever given in the Columbia basin."

NATIONAL ROWING REGATTA.

Will Be Held at Duluth, Minnesota
This Year, Second Time Held in the West.

Duluth, Minn., Aug. 11.—Crack oarsmen from all over the United States are here today to compete in the annual championship scull and gig races, called the National Rowing Regatta, directed by the National Association of Amateur Oarsmen under the auspices of the Duluth Boat club. The regatta will end tomorrow.

Among the better known sportsmen of this class were: Fred Fortmeyer, James Pilkington and John O. Reagan of New York; James Denigro of St. Paul, R. H. Pelton of Brooklyn, James Fox and George McGrath of Boston, John Coogan of Springfield, Mass.; J. V. Lothrop of Detroit and H. P. Burke and Chas. Preisandaz of Philadelphia.

This is the first time the regatta has come west for four years. It never has been west of Peoria, Ill. Lynn, Mass., and Buffalo made a strong bid for the regatta this year, but to bring in as many western amateurs as possible, it was thought best to give the event to Duluth. J. H. Barnes of the Duluth club is the man who won the day with his arguments before the association's committee.

A BIG PROBLEM.

Colorado Bullmoosers Deciding What to Do About Hughes.

Denver, Colo., Aug. 11.—Whether to disband or to name a third state ticket was to be decided at the state assembly of the Progressive party opening here today.

The Progressive state central committee is on record as opposed to an outright endorsement of Charles E. Hughes for president. The committee adopted a substitute motion leaving Bullmoosers free to act independently nationally. It was not expected that today's convention would overthrow this action.

The call for the assembly showed a possible total of 455 delegates based on the Progressive party's vote in Colorado at the last state election but the attendance today was considerably under the maximum number. Many former Progressives have rejoined the Republican party.

Clarence P. Dodge of Colorado Springs has been mentioned for the Progressive nomination for governor but it was not certain a state ticket would be named today.
