SATURDAY NIGHT THOUGHTS.

The Allies altogether have made a little progress this week, particularly on the east side of the big battlefield. This week the Italians, who had become somewhat obscure, almost lost sight of, suddenly emerged from the shadows and began an aggressive movement that has attracted much attention. In fact the Italians have been doing things, among other slaughtering about fifty thousand Austrians, and losing many men of their own. But, what we are interested in is, where is the end of the unfortunate struggle?

One of the most difficult things to solve is how any one of the big countries interested can let go. It is not hard for a small country like Serbia to sink out of sight; but for the bigger nations, it is almost impossible. Some day it will have to come, and the sooner the better for civilization, if any one knows what that is.

In this country we have the Mexican trouble splendidly under control, with arrangements for a conference for its final settlement. Many things indicate that with the fellowship of the U. S. Mexico will emerge from the trouble more of a nation than it has ever been before. There are indications of a reorganization that shall operate for better things in the future.

In this connection, while on the subject, the campaign of Mr. Hughes for the presidency is causing some interest because of his making the administration's handling of the Mexican situation an issue. This is certainly pleasing to the friends of Mr. Wilson, for the masses generally appreciate the splendid manner in which the difficult situation has been taken care of in the interest of justice and humanity. The United States is fortunate that it did not have a Hughes or Roosevelt in the chair during the present crisis. Not only is the honor of the country being conserved, but, as well, the lives of our boys are being preserved, which is a big thing if it comes near one's own home.

This is much better than to put money into the coffers of Hearst and the oil owners of big Mexican properties.

The prospect of a strike that will tie up the business of the country is making people nervous. It is difficult to tell how the thing will fall; but things are at work that make it a critical matter. So large is the matter that it calls for mediation with arbitration. It is a national affair that should be settled in a manner that shall make it permanent. It will be a big thing when labor and capital can get close enough together to be so friendly as to insure the avoidance of all disquieting strikes.
