INTERESTING THINGS ABOUT BORDER SITUATION

Robert E. Green of This City Has Letter Written By Sec. of War Baker.

Following is part of a letter from Secy. of War Baker, in response to one from H. L. Baker, a relative of R. E. Green, of this city, representative of the Blake McFall Co., regarding the return of troops at the border.

"I have a very earnest hope that the trouble there will clear up soon. Had the president not called for the state militia there is no telling what might have developed on the border. We now have relative peace and security for the U. S. citizens on the line, but of course this sort of police duty or soldiering is not attractive to young men who have other occupations in life. Neither the president or I have been able to fix in our own minds even as a guess when these troops, all or part, can be withdrawn, but both he and I cherish the hope that it can be soon, and for both of us, the sooner the better.

Signed, NEWTON BAKER, Secy. War.

Below is also a copy of a paragraph in a letter from a nephew of Mr. Green, Donald Robert Baker, Co. G, 7th Inf., stationed at McAllen, Texas:

"This talk of bad camps, poor food, etc., is all rot. Of course it is no picnic, but as soldiers we cannot expect that. Food is good and plentiful. Work is also hard and plentiful. I will admit I don't like using a pick and shovel, but we are not over worked and the government is certainly treating us better than the men in concentration camps during the Spanish American War. Altogether, altho it is the American soldier's privilege to 'kick'—and we always will—our lot is cast in pleasant, altho it is hot places. I say hurrah for our war and kindred departments even if I am a Progressive."

SCHOOL ON WHEELS.

Southern Pacific Helps Employees to Keep their Children in School.

A school on wheels is operated on the rails of the Southern Pacific company.

In Southern Pacific Extra Session gang under Froman Taft, who has a crew of fifty men on Superintendent Whalen's Los Angeles division, there are 250 more children who are being taught daily in a box car which has been fitted up with benches. They have a teacher who instructs them daily in English and Spanish and in primary work. The results, thus far, have not only been satisfactory, but the class of men in the gang remains high. As the gang moves along from place to place, so does the school-car and the children never have to miss a day's attendance. Superintendent Whalen has now made arrangements to obtain an old passenger coach which will be fitted up with benches and blackboards and which will be easier to heat, expecting in this way to improve materially the conditions in this unique school room. He has furthermore arranged to fit up a hospital car for the women and children in the camp who become ill.
