A FALSE STATEMENT.

Mr. Hughes says: "The Democratic party has always been a party of opposition to progress. There has not been a national movement in response to a national demand that has not had to run over the prostrate form of the Democratic party."

Even the ordinary man can readily see that there is no truth in this statement. The election of United States senators by direct vote of the people is one of the most progressive pieces of legislation secured in the last fifty years. It was enacted under the Wilson administration. The new currency reserve act is, in the most emphatic sense, very progressive. It is progressive from first to last. The rural credit system was brought into use under this administration. What could be more progressive than this law. This new law is more in the interest of the farmers than any law ever passed by a republican congress.

Many other acts of progressive legislation could be named as having been enacted under Wilson but it is not necessary as those above named are amply sufficient to flatly contradict what Mr. Hughes says.

DEEDS AND WORDS

Mr. Hughes says we want "deeds" and not "words." Very well, let us see how this applies to the course of Mr. Hughes with reference to woman suffrage. Last fall the people of New York state voted on the question of woman suffrage. Did Mr. Hughes announce himself as being in favor of the measure? No, indeed, he did not, and if he had, such announcement would have been merely "words." But did Mr. Hughes vote for the measure? He did not, and if he had, such act would have been "deeds."

With Mr. Wilson the case was entirely different. He went down to New Jersey and registered so that he might vote for woman suffrage, and afterwards when the election came on he went down to New Jersey again and voted for woman suffrage. Now, that was "deeds" and not "words." Mr. Hughes has never gone further than "words," and he says "words" do not count. Mr. Wilson has done a great deal more for woman suffrage than Mr. Hughes has and he is not blowing about it either.

AS SEEN BY NEUTRALS.

The following is from an eastern religious paper, showing plainly how the masses stand in reference to Wilson and Hughes:

"The notification of Charles E. Hughes as nominee of the Republican party for president of the United States is notable because of the address of the nominee, who, as the leader of his party, was expected to strike the keynote of the campaign. It must be confessed that, except from a strictly partisan viewpoint, it is somewhat disappointing. It lacks in judicial poise and that high constructive quality expected. It is destructive, rather than constructive. There is no bonafide bill of particulars as to what he would do if elected, nor of what he would have done under conditions which he sharply criticises. He makes lofty appeals to patriotism and Americanism, but Mr. Wilson has preceded him in similar appeals. There is here no keynote that has not already been sounded. In treating of the Lusitania massacre he is both vague and unjust. The New York Tribune criticises the address in this particular. It says: "The difficulty with Mr. Hughes' comment lies in the fact that it supplies just exactly that degree of vagueness which will enable the German-Americans to endorse it and continue in their campaign directed against Mr. Wilson because he failed in all things to satisfy them."
