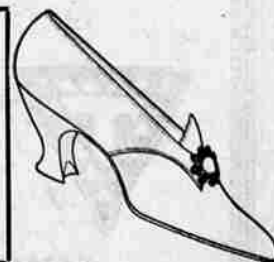

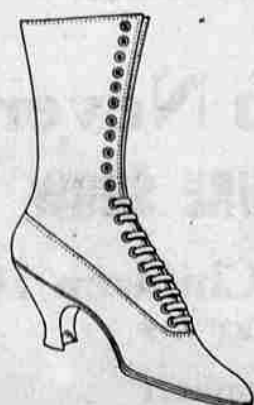

A BUSY PLACE AT THE FURNITURE FACTORY

Work Being Rushed to Have Plant Ready in September To Make Furniture.

There is no busier place around Albany these days than the Albany Furniture Mfg. Co.'s plant, where Foreman Sherel Smith is pushing work in the reconstruction of the buildings into one large structure, arranged for work along efficient lines. All the machinery is being replaced and the shafting relined. New machinery is ready to be set, the best sander to be secured, and an up to date varnisher among other things, up in the finishing department in the second story.

The new office on the northeast corner is about finished, a new stairway is up and a new elevator will be put in. In fact it is like a new place, a modern furniture making plant.

The boiler has been set, and today Wm. Hofflich has been putting the pipe in position. Then the boiler will be housed with brick blocks, which is also the material being used for the new dry kiln.

The factory will leave nothing out, hence a metal flag staff is being erected and old glory will float over the building, neat in its newly painted dress. When completed it will be a plant Albany will have reason to be proud of, in first-class hands, with business ahead, prepared to do business on a business basis.

It is expected to have the first machinery running on stock the first of the month; but it will be later before the first furniture is actually completed. Extension and parlor tables will be the specialty, but some stock on hands will be used up into dressers.

Fifteen or sixteen men have been for several weeks in getting the plant ready for the new enterprise.
