RURAL CREDITS SYSTEM CLEARLY SET FORTH

Herbert Myrick, at Portland, Gave an Address Explaining New Arrangement.

A. C. Schmitt, of the First National Bank Saturday night heard Herbert Myrick, in his address before the most important of the rural credit system getting some facts of great interest to the farmers. Here are some of them.

The rural credit system is intended to do for the farmers what the federal reserve does for business and banking. The backwardness of the farming interests in this country is said to be due to a lack of cheap money, paying too high a rate of interest for good farm loans, the only kind that will be accepted under the rural credit system.

The system calls for twelve central district banks, known as land banks. Over all is to be a federal board of five members, four to be appointed by the president, with the secretary of the treasury an ex-officio member.

Each district will have a local board, and secretary and appraiser, appointed by the federal board, also an examining committee. Stock subscriptions to the amount of \$750,000 are then received for each District Land Bank, either by the public, or if they fail, then by the government. Officers are paid by the government, directors are not paid. Dividends will be paid when earned, the government to receive no interest for funds advanced for starting banks. It takes ten farmers to organize locally to receive loans, managing its own affairs, under direction of district bank. It has its secretary-treasurer, receiving limited pay, and committee of three on appraisement, without remuneration. Before organization there must be requests for loans amounting to \$20,000 by subscribers to stock, equal to 5 per cent of loan wanted, which he must hold until he pays the loan. The stock will pay a dividend, and will be redeemed by district bank when loan is paid. The money comes from the district bank after the loan has been approved. Amount of loans, \$500 to \$10,000 at a rate of interest not exceeding 6 per cent for five to forty years, payable semi-annually covering interest and sufficient of principal to wipe it out in the term of the loan; but borrower may pay more if desired.

An expert investigates local appraisements, made under oath. Clear title abstracts are required. After the loan the district bank issues bonds for amount of loan, bearing not exceeding 5 per cent interest. If bonds sell for sufficient price rate of future loans may be reduced.

The system is not a money maker; but to furnish loans for farmers on land security only, at a low rate of interest.

BIG SHOOT BEGUN.

OSWALD WEST TAKES POKE AT ADMINISTRATION

Former Governor Has Laugh Now on Those Who Criticise His Prison Policy.

Ex-Governor Oswald West took a pleasant little fling at the Withycomb administration this morning when he sent the following telegram to his old former campaign manager, Ben W. Olcott:

Ben W. Olcott,
Secy. of state.

Press reports indicate the governor is seeking advice as to proper methods of conducting penitentiary. Please call his attention to the fact that I have on file in my office clippings from the Oregonian, Telegram and other friendly newspapers covering a period of four years and carrying many suggestions which are at his disposal.

(Signed) OSWALD WEST

During his term of office as governor Oswald West was ridiculed and criticised about his prison policy, honor system and many other reforms that he inaugurated at the penal institution in Salem. The results of his administration proved the wisdom of his course, for, during his time, he had better discipline, more respect from the unfortunate men who had placed themselves under the leash of the law and fewer escapes than any other administration.

In spite of the fact that he let the whole camps of convicts remain away from the prison for weeks without a guard and trustees were given the confidence of the executive and allowed to go about their duties freely, the number of escapes was surprisingly low.

Under the present administration there have been a large number of escapes, many men going who have but a short time to serve. The fact suggests a very poor condition at the prison and it is a common fact among newspaper men of the capital that the affairs are in a rotten shape. Under Warden Minto the prisoners are accorded treatment that reflects on ancient prison policies. Some of them have been known to remark that they would rather be dead than stay there, that they would rather face the guards' bullets in an escape than to endure the present system at the
