Sheep.—Nearly 3700 head were received Monday on a steady market. Top lambs are still quoted at \$8.25 and other grades in proportion. Market closed steady.

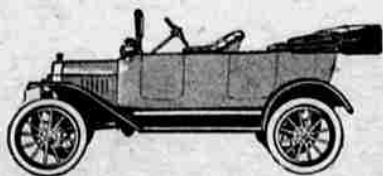

SILVER CREEK FALLS PLACE WORTH SEEING

No Prettier Sight Anywhere,
With Good Roads All
Way This Side.

There can be nothing prettier anywhere in the world than Silver Creek Falls, forty miles from Albany, up in the Cascades in Marion county, as one views them from a shelf in a path back under huge rocks directly under the falls. It is a sight to make one feel one's smallness compared with nature's offerings. Yosemite has its bigger shows, but nothing neater than this. The writer, who saw the falls for the first time yesterday was filled to overflowing with the splendid sight.

The trip there was made by three sisters and their husbands, of which the writer is one, going in by way of Marion, Stayton and Sublimity and coming back by way of Sublimity and Aumsville, much the better route. The roads are in splendid condition; in the vicinity of Sublimity and Aumsville and further up in the mountains, some of them Macadam made, and practically all of them are in fine running shape.

In the Silver Creek Falls district the tax payers themselves have appropriated ten mills a year for ten years for road improvement, and they are getting it under skillful builders. We passed a high class road roller, another machine and a scraper. It is a slam on valley people to have it said that they are making better roads up in the hills than down here, but they are doing it. One thing is that they have the rock for the purpose.

Clear up on the hill just before reaching Silver Creek Falls we stopped at a house, a neat place, for water, and had the pleasure of meeting Percy H. Brown, a bachelor, which we mention for the benefit of young ladies who would like to get up in the world, besides Mr. Brown is a fine man.

On the way in we also passed four young ladies, two from Sherwood and two from Salem, on a hike to the falls, for a several days' visit. They were well togged for the trip, one of the girls in short dresses, one in bloomers, two, one of them Miss McLagan, whose folks live near Tangent, but who resides in Salem, in short, comfortable neat looking pants, that made the girls look like movie artists. They walked fifteen miles yesterday and were certainly some hungry when they reached the falls.

Above the falls Mr. Volz has a neat park, for visitors, charging 25 cents for autos and five cents for single persons, with tables for lunches, and other conveniences. He has been there fourteen years.

But the falls are the real thing, owned by T. C. Smith, Tom Kay and others of Salem. They are immense as a spectacle, but it is doubtful if they will ever have great commercial value because of the low water in summer, when the power is bound to be low; but for scenery the place is superb, and many visit the falls and leave enthused. They are twelve miles from Silverton and all the way from six to 16 miles from Sublimity. Distances are uncertain. One of the girl hikers said that for ten miles people told them the falls were three miles away.

In the vicinity there is a hamlet with a population of about a hundred, with a school of fifty or sixty, and a church.

Along the way all kinds of crops look fine and farms prosperous.

Among the visitors at the park yesterday were Dr. Wedd, a prominent physician, and family, of Mt. Angel. There were a number of others, but Sunday is the big day, a crowd will be there last Sunday, among them five auto loads from Albany.

ASTORIA REGATTA.

Twenty-First Annual Event Will Be More Than Usually Entertaining.

Astoria, Aug. 23.—A busy committee, under the leadership of F. C. Harley, is closing up the final arrangements for what promises to be the record for Annual Regattas at Astoria Sept. 1, 2, 3, 4, 1916.

These dates have been officially designated by the Pacific International Power Boat Association for the champion speed boat races of the Pacific Coast. Entries already include some of the fastest speed boats of the Northwest, and a whirlwind contest is assured for a fine list of prizes.

The Portland Motor Boat club is arranging their annual cruise so as to include Astoria on the Regatta dates.

In addition to the speed boat contests, there will be fish boat races and sailing boat races between the fishermen of the Lower Columbia. These events always provoke intense rivalry. An unusually attractive list of prizes will be hung up by the committee this year. Cruiser and yacht races will also be promoted.

Mr. John E. Cronan, secretary of the Portland chamber of Commerce, has been designated as admiral of the 21st Annual Regatta, and has appointed a long list of staff officers.

The social event of the regatta will be the "Admiral's and Queen's Ball," to be held at the Port of Astoria docks on Friday night, September 1. The governor of Oregon and other prominent state officials of the northwest will be in attendance.

Preparations are being made for elaborate receptions to old-time Astorians who have been invited from far and wide to return for "homecoming" week in connection with the Regatta. A great sacred concert, with appropriate addresses will be given on Sunday, September 3, in their honor. McElroy's Band, the O. W. R. & N. Co.'s band, and the S. P. & S. Ry. Co.'s band of Portland, and Hagga's band of Astoria, will provide music during the Regatta.

There will be a large program of sports of all kinds and numerous carnival attractions.

Declared That It Will Be the

Scio, Or., Aug. 23.—Aeroplane flights, harness and running races, free entertainment specialties, stock exhibits and displays by school children are only a few of the features promised for the Tenth Annual Linn County Fair to be held at the Scio grounds, September 6th, 7th and 8th. Governor Withycombe will attend the opening day of the fair and will deliver an address.

"Last year," said Dr. A. G. Prill, president of the fair association, "we held a most successful fair but this year we are going one better. We have arranged a three day program crammed full of varied interest. The children's fair, so popular last year, will be repeated on a larger scale. The boys and girls of the county have been preparing for this year's exhibit and keen interest will be staked when prize are awarded.

"The ladies have brought their departments up to practical readiness with a new building now nearly completed for the housing of exhibits in the art and ladies fancy work departments. A new and lusty crop of babies will be entered in the prize baby contest.

"Linn county stock is known the world over and the blue ribboners will be in parade in connection with the prize stock exhibits. Harness and running races will be prominent in the program and fast times are insured, for the Scio track holds the half mile state record of 1:03.

Music will be plentifully supplied by the Knights of Pythias band. Dancing will be indulged in every evening and all the forms of diversion common to a fair will be on hand with the merry-go-round, ferris wheel, racks and—of course—the peanuts and popcorn as a side attraction."
