Chairman H. R. Worth of the Harvest Festival, appointed an advertising committee composed of Roy Newport, Charles P. Ohling and Ralph R. Cronise. Attractive placards will be printed at once and placed throughout the county. Later large posters will be plastered throughout the county. The people in every part of the Willamette valley will be made aware of the fact that the big show of the year is to be held in Albany, Oct. 12 to 14. Some novel advertising stunts are being worked out and will be pulled off in due time.
