COMMISSIONER HOFF REPORTS ON LINN'S SAW MILLS

There Are Twelve Small Mills Cutting Over 15,000,000 Feet Yearly.

According to the report of Labor Commissioner Hoff, Linn county saw mills show a slight increase over the cut of 1915. The county has no large mills, that at Mill City of the Hammond Co. being just across the line in Marion county.

There are twelve mill plants in the county, making the following showing:

Value of plants, \$58,200; daily capacity, 259,000 feet; daily output on a 12-hour basis, 103,500 feet. Seven operate ten hours and day and five of them nine hours.

One plant that has been shut down for two years has been operating since April 1, 1916. One does planing only. Eleven use a total of 567 steam horsepower, and one 65 electric.

There are 51 skilled and 61 unskilled men employed in addition to four employees in the office, not counting firm members. Skilled labor averages \$2.75 a day; unskilled \$1.98 and office help \$2.50. An average of the highest wages paid to any one is \$3.08 and of the lowest, \$1.87.

Some of the plants employ men in the woods, others contract, while other plants use the mill force in the woods when the mill is shut down. The average number of men in the woods under pay from the plants is 14, and they average \$2.39 a day.

Up to August 15 the plants had cut this year 15,111,000 feet of lumber in addition to 11,680,000 shingles. Skilled labor had been paid \$19,136.22, unskilled \$17,633.88, woodsmen \$4,905.60 and office help \$3,434.15, a total of \$45,109.85.

With the enormous amount of timber in the county the showing is a very poor one, speaking for what must some time be done in the future.

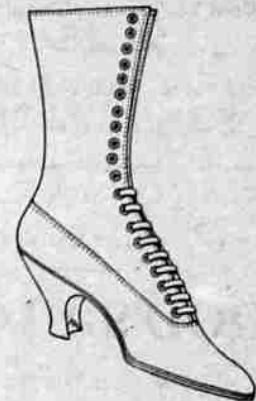
