A pamphlet just received tells about how the Germans expected to take Verdun in a short time, bound to have it because of its strategic location; but six months have transpired, and Verdun is no nearer capture apparently, displaying one of the uncertainties of this great war, which has had many eye-openers for the world.

At the end of this week it is difficult to observe much change during seven days. If any it is on the side of the Russians, who have made some progress, but in France it has been a desperate struggle for each side to hold its own. The consensus of opinion seems to be, though, that the Allies are making a slight, though hardly perceptible headway. Reports of trenches being captured are often followed by their being regained.

America's big strike danger has seen another week pass without the matter being adjusted, though a desperate effort has been made to secure a settlement of differences. The country is not in a position for a strike at this time especially, just at the beginning of the shipment of the harvest products of the west. Then the world has progressed far enough for such things to be settled without the strike method, an unwelcome system.

The matter of hours, though, is one that is going to have to be adjusted permanently, with the railroads the same as others, and it will be well if it can be accomplished without tying up the industries of the country.

In politics Mr. Hughes has continued his tour of the country. The more independent-republican papers freely admit that he has lost strength by the trip, injuring his cause rather than helping it. His attacks on President Wilson will undoubtedly add to the chances of the president for re-election. The trend of sentiment is decidedly in his direction.

In Oregon there has been much interest in the celebration over the completion of the road to Marshfield from Eugene and the rest of the towns along the Southern Pacific. While it has been called a wedding of Eugene and Marshfield because the branch road of the S. P. starts at Eugene, as a matter of fact the road is of just as much advantage to Salem, Woodburn, Albany and other places as it is to Eugene, except that it is nearer and passengers sometimes stop there for awhile. A city enjoys the name of it. Albany always has in connection with the Corvallis & Eastern; but these network of roads are of general advantage to the state.
