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ALBANY HIGH SCHOOL BOYS MADE A LONG HIKE

Two Albany high school students, Frank Eastburn and Vernon Henderson returned Friday morning from a hike which took them over a hundred miles since last Monday morning.

The boys, accompanied by the Eastburn dog, Kaiser, started from Albany Monday morning taking the train to Lebanon and thence hiking to Cascadia, stopping there over Monday night and journeying on to Upper Soda next day; staying there till Wednesday morning, then began the return journey.

Wednesday the boys made good time, coming 34 miles in 14 hours. Seeing that they had plenty of time, a side trip was made to Sodaville. During the whole hike the boys covered 103 miles and visited eight towns, Lebanon, Sodaville, Tallman, Sweet Home, Foster, Cascadia, White City and Upper Soda. They camped wherever they saw fit, carrying their entire outfit with them. They report fairly good roads as far as Cascadia, but from there in, poor. The boys saw one four-point buck between Upper Soda and White City, but did not shoot at it.

Rev. and Mrs. Fagan Leave Sunday to Begin Evangelistic Work.

Sunday morning's sermon will be the last that Rev. M. Howard Fagan will preach as pastor of the Christian church of this city. Sunday afternoon Rev. and Mrs. Fagan will leave for Hood River, where, Sunday evening, they will begin a series of revival meetings. The Fagans have taken up evangelistic work and will follow this line in the future. Mrs. Fagan will do the solo work. Following the Hood River series they will go to Stockton, California, and from there they will return to Oregon where their time is engaged until the last of January.

Rev. Fagan will have completed two years service as pastor of the local Christian church. He came here Sept. 1, 1914. Rev. Fagan came from New Zealand to America six years ago to study for the ministry. He was educated for his work at the University of Oregon and at the Eugene Bible University, coming to Albany directly from there.

During their stay here both Rev. and Mrs. Fagan have made hosts of friends and it is with regret that they are seen to leave the city.
