MINT HARVEST WILL SOON BE IN OPERATION

Stills Being Erected and Repaired For Extracting Oil Next Week.

In a few days the harvest of another crop that is coming into importance in this locality will be in progress when the mint still begins to work. Next week the crop on the O. B. Marshall, E. B. Wallace and surrounding places will begin to be taken in and the valuable oil extracted. Marshall has between 30 and 40 acres of his own mint and what he has planted on the shares, which will make between 1500 and 2000 pounds of oil under ordinary conditions. It is expected that the crop will be lighter this year, however, on account of the fact that the late season interfered with the maturing of the plants. The old plants may bear as heavily, but the new crop is sure to be lower.

Mr. Marshall owns 25 acres of mint at Clatskanie, on the lower Columbia river, and is at present at that place getting his still in shape for the season's run.

The other mint growers in this vicinity are also getting busy and erecting or repairing stills, preparing for the gathering of the mint oil.

UNCLE SAM'S PASTURE.

From the Forest Service, U. S. Dept. of Agriculture, Portland, Oregon.

Figures just compiled in the office of the district forester, George H. Cecil, Portland, show that 157,689 cattle and horses, and 996,771 sheep and goats, belonging to 3,454 permittees, were admitted to the National Forest ranges of Oregon and Washington during the period July 1, 1915, to June 30, 1916.

These figures give an increase of 20,834 cattle and horses, and a decrease of 11,669 sheep and goats, compared with the number submitted during the preceding fiscal year. The decrease in sheep is accounted for by the fact that many sheep men have gone into the cattle business. The figures as a whole show a big increase in the number of stock on the forests of the district. Since four sheep are considered equal to one cow on a range basis, after deducting the 11,669 decrease in sheep, the figures show an increase equivalent to 71,667 sheep.

The returns also show that during the 1915 season the stock grazed belonged to 2,962 owners, but this year 3,454 owners are represented, indicating clearly that the forest service is steadily carrying out its policy of making the widest distribution among the small ranchers adjoining the forest. Six years ago there were 1,683 grazing permittees using the National Forest ranges of the two states.

The annual value of the farm woodlot products of the United States is over \$195,000,000.

More people are spending their vacations on National Forests this summer than have ever done so before, many persons traveling long distances by automobile in order to camp in these public playgrounds.

At a recent meeting of the Condonally Stock Association, at which there were twenty members present, it was decided not to allow any bulls on the range after 1916 except those of beef grade and having registered papers.

Tourists registers are in use on many National Forests. By registering their names and destination, persons going into the mountains can arrange to have telegrams and other important messages forwarded by the Forest Rangers.

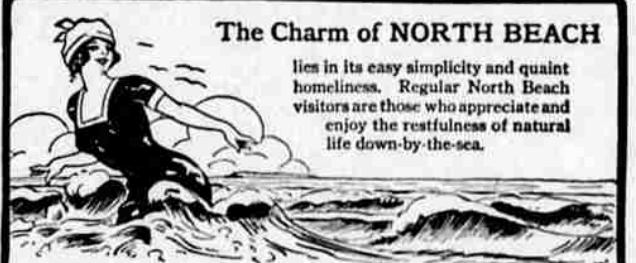
