Mr. McIntosh states that while walking up the road from his camp Sunday he heard the approach of an animal in the creek nearby and on investigation found that a doe was wading and swimming across the creek, while endeavoring to protect a young fawn by her side. While there were no animals within hearing, it was evident from various signs that the deer had been chased by dogs. KALICH PLAYS MASTER-PIECES OF TRAGIC POWER

Something of What the Great Artist Has Done and Is Doing in Fox Pictures.

Mme. Bertha Kalich, probably the greatest tragedienne of the emotional type since Bernhardt's retirement, has a record of plays which are strikingly void of the ordinary since the beginning of her career as a youthful opera singer in her European home. This great international actress of the international type of Jewish womanhood finds in "Ambition," her second photodrama for the William Fox organization, a vehicle which especially pleases her, to say nothing of the public. For it is a story truly American, with all the goodness and badness of American life in it; and Madame loves America even more than her native land. She deems herself a true American, by adoption all the more loyal to her chosen land.

"Anyone may be American by birth—which is chance," she says. "For one to make herself or himself American means that it really counts."

Mme. Kalich's first photodrama for the William Fox organization was "Slander," and her more recent film is destined for equal or greater success. At the early age of fourteen Mme. Kalich was in operetta at the Bucharest National Theatre. She remained there until her talent had asserted itself to such a degree that she was advanced to leading roles. A tour followed. Her fame grew.

Twenty years ago the manager of one of the Yiddish theatres on New York's East Side induced her to come to this country. On the East Side this young and remarkable woman played in the strenuous Yiddish melodramas and in plays of Sudermann, Ibsen, Tolstoi, Strindberg, Sardou and Gordin, drawing from uptown New York audiences that never before had entered a foreign-language theatre.

Mme. Kalich achieved great popularity, accumulated a fortune on the East Side and became one of the principal owners of the Kalich theatre, named in her honor. At that time she was the first artist of any race for whom a New York theatre had been named. Several of the plays in which Mme. Kalich starred in the theatre bearing her name made net profits of \$40,000 each in runs of fourteen consecutive weeks. This was then unparalleled in foreign language theatres.

Mme. Kalich obtained her introduction to the English language audiences of America chiefly through her remarkable acting of Maeterlinck's "Monna Vanna," under Harrison Grey Fiske's management. Mme. Kalich also played the part of Miriam

TOO MANY LAWYERS.

Root Pleads for Weeding Out of Too Numerous and Incompetent Lawyers.

Chicago, Aug. 30.—President Elihu Root of the American Bar Association pleaded for a weeding out of the unnecessary and incompetent among the 114,000 lawyers in the United States in his annual address at the opening of the meeting of that organization here today.

"It is true of the American people generally," said Mr. Root, "that too many of us have been trying to get something out of the country and too few of us have been trying to serve it."

Basing his plea for efficiency in the administration of the law upon the statement that we must get down to brass tacks in all our affairs if we're going to keep pace with Europe after the war, Mr. Root flayed our "cumbersome machinery of justice" and called upon the lawyers to forget their selfishness and give the country a little service not only in law administration, but in law making. He said that as a rule only the youngest and least experienced lawyers get into our lawmaking bodies, local, state and national. Concerning the law and the lawyers, Mr. Root said in part: "There is great economic waste in the administration of the law in state and nation. We spend vast sums building court houses, paying judges, clerks and others and the product in justice is disproportionate to the plant and working force. There is no country in the world where the doing of justice is burdened by such heavy overhead charges. It all causes an enormous waste of time on the part of witnesses, jury panel and parties."

"The ease with which admission to the bar is secured in many jurisdictions and the attraction of a career which affords a living without manual labor has crowded the bar with more lawyers than are necessary. Of the 114,000 lawyers in the United States a very considerable part are not needed. If that business were conducted like the business of any great industrial or transportation company which is striving for the highest efficiency at the least cost in order to compete successfully with its rivals, a very considerable percentage of the 114,000 would be discharged."
