G. A. R. ENCAMPMENT.

Fifteen Thousand Veterans March
Over the Hills of Kansas City
Today.

(By United Press)

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 30.—Fifteen
thousand grizzled fighters of the Civil
War marched over the downtown
section today in the Annual Grand
Army of the Republic Parade.

With a score of life and drum corps
beating time and brass bands playing

national airs, the grey-haired veterans
moved slowly over the line which in-
cluded many hills.

The streets were thronged with
spectators who cheered each state
contingent as it passed and the veter-
ans doffed their hats and saluted al-
most continuously.

W. F. Calhoun, commander of the
Department of Illinois, and his state
organization headed the procession,
followed by the Wisconsin and Penn-
sylvania Departments. The Ohio and
New York veterans were next in line.
Then followed the Southern and
Western Departments. Missouri brot
up the rear.

As the parade swung into Main
Street there were many stragglers but
they fought bravely to pass in review
before their commander-in-chief, Elias
R. Manfort, of Cincinnati, and his
staff and state and city officials, who
occupied the reviewing stand.

LUMBER BUSINESS AFFECTED BY SHORTAGE OF CARS

The manner in which the shortage
of cars is affecting the lumber busi-
ness is shown in the following:

The G. H. P. Lumber company of
Hillsboro, Or., is facing ruin for want
of cars, according to a letter received
by the public service commission yester-
day.

The company which took over the
business of the Hillsboro Lumber
company had thirteen cars in use in
its logging operations, but the South-
ern Pacific recently took away six
of them, leaving only seven. Accord-
ing to the manager of the company this
means practically doubling their
logging cost, and will put them out of
business. In addition to this difficulty
they have been unable to get cars for
shipment of their products.

The company is obliged to keep
running, as it has a tract of land
which must be logged before January
1 or the stumpage will be forfeited.

The Spaulding Logging company
has become so seriously hampered by
lack of cars for shipment that it is
considering shutting down the New-
berg mill and if cars are not received
in sufficient number the operation of
the Salem mill also is likely to be re-
stricted if not entirely suspended.

This is said would throw 175 men
out of employment and mean a loss
in payrolls to the city of about \$10,000
a month.

BANK CLEARINGS 40 PER CT. MORE THAN YEAR AGO

Duns: Various influences, most of
them temporary, have caused some re-
cession in the volume of business.
Production and distribution have both
been lessened appreciably by oppres-
sive heat over a wide area, while in
some industries the necessity of re-
pairs has become imperative and in
others belated inventories are being
taken. Operations at many of the
works are also hindered by the scar-
city of raw materials and shortage of
labor, and the high prices and gener-
ally sold up condition of mills and
factories, naturally tend to restrict
buying. Yet if in some important de-
partments business moves under re-
duced momentum, in nearly all it is
surprisingly large for the midsummer
period and previous gains should be
augmented as the season advances.
Extensive preparations are made for a
general resumption of activity in the
fall and winter, and in certain branch-
es, notably in pig iron, the revival has
set in earlier than expected. Notwith-
standing the diminished harvests, the
labor unrest and other disquieting el-
ements, optimism continues the domi-
nant note in reports from every sec-
tion of the country. But while the
magnitude of forward plans testifies
to widespread confidence in the fu-
ture, the absence of speculative ex-
cesses constitutes the best feature of
the situation. It is noteworthy that
in spite of the recent remarkable ex-
pansion in commerce and industry,
with profits unprecedented, there is
still manifest a commendable disposi-
tion to confine commitments within
the limits of safety. In this respect,
at least, existing uncertainties are pro-
ductive of good. Measured by bank
clearings at centers outside New
York, business this week is 40.2 per
cent, larger than last year, though no
all of the gain is in quantities, as
prices are appreciably higher.
