BIG ONE ON HUGHES.

Albert de Roode, for six years assistant secretary of Civil Service Reform association and now its counsel, shows from the records that Mr. Hughes, as governor of New York ordered 218 civil service exemptions in less than four years, as against 182 exemptions in Odell's four years and sixty-two in Higgins' two years. In addition, under the Hughes administration there were 345 "special exemptions" with \$1,076,249.88 compensation, where appointments were made to competitive positions, created under Gov. Hughes, served as dispensers of over \$1,000,000 in spoils. During the first year of the operation of the law sixty-seven positions were exempted by Mr. Hughes. "As a matter of fact," says Mr. de Roode, "those interested in civil service reform made repeated efforts during the Hughes administration to have him appoint a vigorous commission in full sympathy with the merit system, but without success."

METHODS—NOT DEEDS.

The more, signal the service rendered the people by any act of President Wilson, the more bitter the attacks on him by Republican papers. He kept the country out of war. How they abuse his method of doing it. He settled the strike situation by right. How Republican editors rave over his method of doing it. Heretofore their slogan of criticism has been "words not deeds"; but now when his words are few and his action prompt they are even more vociferous in their abuse. Unhappy is the lot of Republican editors under the Wilson administration; in every case, to avoid palpable folly, they are forced to the tacit admission that either his action was right while his method only was wrong, or his method was right and his action wrong. One can detect a willing note, a minor chord of misery in all their objections.

The Brewers' Journal for September 1st, 1916, openly declares the contempt of the liquor dealers for laws: "A Perfect Stranger," it says, "writes three long columns in the Detroit 'Saturday Night' to show that saloons are open in Detroit on Sundays. What a waste of time, paper and ink! Everybody knows that our large American cities, the centers of learning, industry, finance, fashion and intelligence, the inhabitants care not for 'laws' made by time-serving politicians, at the behest of economically and intellectually limited theologians and their few and misled followers!"

OLD GUARD COMMANDS.

That the Republican party is a party of inaction as well as reaction is shown by the vote in the senate on the Emergency Revenue measure. Every Republican senator, save five, when voting on that bill, voted against:
1. A non-partisan tariff commission.
2. Readjustment of tariff on dyes-stuffs.

4. Tax on excessive profits on war munitions.
5. Inheritance tax on swollen fortunes—the most equitable of all taxes.
6. Increase in income surtaxes—a small increase in the taxes of the very rich.
Of such are the leaders of the forces that nominated Hughes, and who will be in power in the event of Republican success.
