It has become pretty plain to this

30 cents of capital.

The Political war in the U. S. will  
be settled only by a decisive clash of  
votes on the 7th day of November.  
Both sides are claiming practically the  
certainty of election of their candi-  
dates. This is customary and is bound  
to be the experience. It is not often  
that a politician will admit any advan-  
tage on the other side. The writer  
can't figure out anything but the elec-  
tion of Mr. Wilson, that's the only  
way his pencil will move, and his con-  
fidence increases; but, after all only  
the election will settle the matter.

The Carranzistas and Villistas had  
a fight this week, a bloodthirsty affair,  
like all battles. Had the Americans  
had a chance in the fight there would  
have been something doing. The Mex-  
icans are pretty good at shooting a  
man in the back, but they are poor  
warriors when it comes to open field  
work, and would stand absolutely no  
show against an equal army of Amer-  
icans.

An attempt to involve all of the  
unions of New York City in a sym-  
pathetic strike failed, as it should fail.  
Strike leaders have no right to in-  
volve others not interested person-  
ally in a strike of a different organi-  
zation. Under proper laws the time  
will come when strikes will be impos-  
sible of a character to cripple busi-  
ness conditions. The good of a great  
nation or city even should be above  
labor contentions. There must be or-  
ganized a way of settlement of dif-  
ferences thru arbitration or otherwise,  
in a manner not to disturb the  
commercial life of a city, and keep  
business conditions in a turmoil.

One who visits the state fair this  
week certainly cannot help being im-  
pressed with the wonderful resources  
of this state, along many lines. The  
range is wide and striking. We cer-  
tainly have a state of marvellous pos-  
sibilities. What is needed is more  
people for continued development.  
The great harvest of this year has  
demonstrated that there is big money  
in farming in Oregon where con-  
ducted along intelligent lines.

Farming it is being learned is a sci-  
ence, and farmers do well to make a  
study of it, carrying it out in prac-  
tice. This suggests that the county  
agent has much merit, a man edu-  
cated for the business, understanding its  
needs.
