IS DISTRICT SUPT.

Albany Pastor Succeeds Dr. J. T. Abbett As Head of Eugene District of M. E. Church.

CONFERENCE AT LEBANON
CLOSES WITH APPOINTMENTS

Most Successful Meeting Held With Good Attendance and Many Good Addresses.

Albany people were agreeably surprised this morning when it became known that Bishop Matthew S. Hughes had appointed Dr. James Moore, pastor of the Methodist church of this city, to succeed Dr. J. T. Abbett as superintendent of the Eugene District of the Methodist church in Oregon. Dr. Moore has been in this city one year, and during that time he has won a firm hold upon the hearts of his congregation and of many other people in Albany. While his appointment is received with pleasure, it is regretted that Dr. Moore will move to Eugene and away from the local church.

Dr. Moore will be succeeded by Rev. Charles E. Gibson, of Spokane, who comes to the local pulpit highly recommended. Rev. Gibson will take charge of the church here as soon as he can get away from Spokane. Dr. Moore has already assumed his new duties and expects to move to Eugene within the next two weeks.

Dr. James Moore, pastor of the Albany church was appointed superintendent of the Eugene district. Dr. W. W. Youngson succeeds Dr. J. W. McDougal as superintendent of the Portland district. Joshua Stansfield, of Indianapolis, and W. L. Airhart, were appointed ministers of the First church, Portland. Rev. H. J. Van Fossen, of Ashland, remains superintendent of the Klamath district and Dr. T. B. Ford of the Salem district.

ASKED TO EXPLAIN

Wilson Will Challenge Him to Say What Changes the Republicans Advocate.

MUST DO SOMETHING

They are deferring the wage arbitration ten days. They are not considering 55 cents an hour straight time."

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WOMEN FIGHT ON FIRST
STREET YESTERDAY

One Paid Fine, Other Pleading Not Guilty For Sunday Fistic Encounter.

An unusual occurrence took place last evening in front of the White House restaurant on First street near Lyon, when two women, Mrs. Charles Freytag and Mrs. Dora Anderson engaged in a fight. Bystanders who witnessed the affair stated it was a fast and furious bout, as the appearance of the contestants indicated when it was over.

It seems that the trouble, according to Mrs. Anderson's version, is the direct result of alleged defamatory remarks made about her by Mrs. Freytag. Mrs. Anderson's mother, Mrs. Stilson, heard about the gossip and yesterday went down to Mrs. Freytag's rooms, east of the White House restaurant, and brought her to the Oregon restaurant, where she put the charges up to other parties for denial.

It is said that Mrs. Freytag became angry and attacked Mrs. Stilson in the restaurant, pounding her about the face. Upon reaching home Mrs. Stilson told her daughter of what happened, and the latter, very much angered, last evening about 8 o'clock went down town, called at the corner of First and Lyon, requested him to go over to Mrs. Freytag's and call her to the telephone. Then she hung up the receiver, and went out and waited.

When Mrs. Freytag came down the steps and into the street she was accosted by Mrs. Anderson, and soon feminine fists were flying, hair coming down and a general scuffling taking place. It is said that the aggressor received the best of the bout and administered quite a beating to her adversary.

This morning Chief of Police Catlin brought the women into Judge Lewelling's court on a charge of fighting. Mrs. Anderson plead guilty and was fined five dollars. Mrs. Freytag plead not guilty and her case was set for trial at 9 o'clock Tuesday morning.

WAITRESS HELD FOR \$2,000

Chicago, Oct. 2.—An auto bandit gang with guns battled with the proprietor and waiters of the Burr Oak Inn near Chicago this morning. Daniel Harnett, an alleged bandit leader was dangerously wounded. The police arrested Lawrence Simon, another gangster and declare he confessed. Samuel Harris, the proprietor, said the bandits kidnapped a waitress and held her for \$200 ransom. The fight started while the bandits and Harris were discussing terms in reference to the ransom.

EXPORT RECORDS BROKEN.
Not Only for America, But for All Countries, During Month of August

Washington, D. C. Sept. 30.—American exports have finally passed the half-billion a month mark. Statistics issued today by the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, of the Department of Commerce, show that the exports for August amounted to \$510,000,000, which is not only the record for this country, but for all countries. It is \$35,000,000 higher than the previous high record, which was established in May, and \$45,000,000 higher than the June Total.

Imports, on the other hand, showed a decrease for August, the total being \$199,247,391. This is a decline of \$47,000,000 as compared with June, the record month. It is greater than the total for any previous August, however. The exports for the year ended with August totaled \$4,750,000,000 and the imports \$2,300,000,000, both totals being far in advance of those for a similar period in any previous year.

Of the August imports, 66.5 per cent entered free of duty, compared with 57.5 per cent in August, 1915.

The favorable trade balance for August was 411 million dollars, compared with an export balance of 119 million in August, 1915, and an import balance of 19 million in August, 1914. For the 12 months to August 31, 1916, the export balance was 2,465 million dollars, as against 1,363 million in the preceding year and 374 million two years ago.

The net inward gold movement for the month of August was 29 million and for the year 410 million dollars, a record total. Last year the net inward gold movement was 146 million and two years ago, a net outward movement of 95 million. Gold imports in August were \$41,238,716, compared with \$61,641,191 in August, 1915, and \$3,045,219 in August, 1914. Gold exports in August were \$11,780,129, against \$1,128,428 in August, 1915, and \$18,125,617 in August, 1914. The year's gold imports were \$518,451,553, as against \$244,035,950 last year and \$59,312,328 two years ago; while gold exports in 1916 were \$108,104,549, compared with \$97,749,270 last year and \$153,984,944 for the 12 months ending with August, 1914.
