Salem, Oct. 2.—In order that the Utah-Idaho Sugar Co. of Grants Pass may compete on a parity with California refineries in shipment of its product, the Southern Pacific company has applied to the Oregon Public Service commission for authority to establish same freight rates from Grants Pass to points in Oregon as are now in effect from San Francisco to same points.

Marshfield—Oregon Power Co. plans extension of power line to Bandon.

Roseburg will ship one carload of beets to Grants Pass sugar factory. Cottage Grove—Chicago buyer says Oregon broccoli comes on market after all other supplies are exhausted and therefore has markets of world exhausted and therefore has markets of world to itself.

Lexington—Evans Bros. sell 1280 acre wheat ranch for \$25,000.

Engene—\$2500 contract let for glass palm room addition to hotel Osborn.

Astoria, Young's shipyards have 7 large ocean going vessels on ways employing 400 skilled workmen.

Marshfield—North Bend Lumber company will install an additional 40 horsepower motor served by the Oregon Power Co. Two other mills have started running full time, employing about 125 men. A local shipyard has received contracts for construction of three additional lumber schooners and will install 40 horsepower additional in motors served by the Power Co. One hundred twenty-five horse power more will be added within a short time.

Waltersville—1100 acre Deernhorn ranch on McKenzie river sells for \$55,000.

Gresham—Several gold nuggets reported found in P. R. L. & P. Co. gravel pit.

Grants Pass—Josephine county gets \$3000 more for Pacific Highway.

There are now 31 vessels under construction in shipyards along the Columbia.

Marshfield—Reported that Smith-Powers Co. is figuring on developing a coal mine on their Eden Ridge holdings.

Prineville voting \$100,000 bonds to aid in financing construction of railroad from main line of Oregon trunk to that city by a vote of 358 to 1, is great advertisement.

Roseburg—Installation of concentrating plant on gravel creek mine will be completed and in operation in 30 days.

Sutherlin—A 50 ton mill to be built for handling ore of old Bonanza quick silver mine which is being reopened 9 miles east of here.

North Bend—Keel for largest boat ever built on Coos Bay has been laid. Boat to be 266 feet over all.

Astoria—Over 600 men are now employed directly and indirectly upon street improvement work here. The viaduct system will consume over four million feet of lumber.

A report from Utah states that Ogden capitalists are adding extensive improvements to Sumpter Valley R. R. in Oregon including several new steel bridges.
