A duet by Prof. Moses on the cornet and Spec Thomas on the trombone was specially good. The other members of the orchestra are F. N. Wood, F. Snyder and Ralph Kenton, first class performers.

Prof. Wilson is one of the most competent instructors in the state on the violin, his large number of students speaking for his ability as an educator of the violin. As a solo performer he is an artist, his offerings being of the highest order. Mrs. Wilson, the pianist, is not only an excellent performer, but as well a teacher of splendid accomplishments.

TEACHING BACHELORS.

Young Men Learn How to Select, Buy, Prepare, Cook and Serve Food in the Home.

Corvallis, Oct. 2.—A men's cooking class for students that batch, has been organized at the Oregon Agricultural College.

In this class the men will be taught how to select, buy, plan, prepare, cook and serve food for their bachelor families for each meal of every day of the week.

The first course of the kind ever conducted at the College was instituted last year in response to many requests for advice in planning and

So they have sought help from the domestic science department and will take a three-hour lesson a week for food requirements of the individuals, comprising each group, in the most economical and palatable forms.

Under the direction of their instructor the men will prepare, cook and eat a scientific meal, and then eat it. They will then prepare similar meals in their bachelor homes for the family group.

By this method last year a group of men kept their living expenses, including board, room, heat, light and water, under \$90 a year. Fred C. Powers, of Oakland, Oregon, their manager, says that the living was good and satisfactory.
