**NOT A SAFE MAN.**

Mr. Hughes wants everything that the Democratic congress enacted considerable of it by the assistance of Republican votes, wiped off the books in the interest of better government. In view of the fact that no congress in the history of the country has ever passed more constructive legislation, a man who takes such a position is dangerous and unfit to be president. Here is a well compiled list of the laws Hughes would blot out. Read them over and then decide whether you will vote for a man who will advocate abolishing them:

The tariff commission law—taking the tariff out of politics—politics out of the tariff and regulating it on scientific business principles.

A law taxing munitions of war.

Law taxing inheritances.

Income tax law—which lifts the burden of taxation from the shoulders of the masses and places it on those better able to bear it.

Anti-dumping law—which will prevent flooding American markets with European goods, the product of cheap labor.

The workmen's compensation law—applying to all government employees.

The law creating a federal labor employment bureau, making post masters employment agents; the government thus serving both employer and employee.

The eight-hour labor law on all government work.

The eight-hour law for railroad employees engaged in operating interstate trains—which averted a nationwide strike.

The Clayton amendment to anti-trust law—preventing control of many big corporations by a few men—declaring that "labor is not a commodity."

Seaman's law—humanizing labor conditions on shipboard—and lessening the dangers of ocean travel.

Rural credits law—giving financial freedom—long-time loans—low interest to farmers.

Merchant-marine shipping law—curbing and controlling the greatest of all trusts, the shipping trust.

Alaska railroad law—opening America's storehouse to the people.

The election of United States senators by direct vote of the people.

The child labor law.

The law extending the parcels post—increasing weight limits—reducing postal charges.

**BIG MEN FOR WILSON**

Charles W. Elliott, president emeritus of Harvard university, a true independent in politics, sometimes supporting Republican presidential candidates and sometimes independents, is the first name on the list of vice-presidents of the Woodrow Wilson Independent league of Boston. Second is the name of Harry A. Garfield president of Williams college, son of James A. Garfield, a republican president. Third is that of F. W. Taussig, professor of political economy at Harvard, one of the forceful critics of the protective tariff. Fourth is Bliss Perry, republican in much of his previous sympathy, formerly editor of the Atlantic Monthly, and now professor of literature in Harvard.

Others in the list include Ray Stannard Baker, magazine writer and former Progressive; Professor Lewis J. Johnson, of Harvard, one of the foremost progressives since the split of 1912; Frederick N. Wier, Republican, formerly district attorney for the Lowell district; Joseph B. Eastman, member of the public service commission.

With Republicans on the stump attempting to have it appear that American prosperity is due to sales of war munitions, the disclosures of Senator Penrose in the senate are interesting. The war revenue bill was pending August 24 last and Senator

Penrose took the floor to oppose the tax on the profits of the war munitions business, which has since become law.

"I think it is no exaggeration to say," Penrose declared, "that a large majority of the manufacturers who went into the munitions business have not fared well; many have gone into bankruptcy; many more have made no money at all; some have made a fair profit, and, of course, a very few have made good profits."
